THE PRINCE REGENT'S LEVEE.

On Tuesday his Royal Highness the Prince Regent held a levee at Carlton-house, which was most numerously and brilliantly attended by all ranks, supposed to exceed even his Royal Highness's first levee. A party of the life guards and foot guards lined Pall Mall and the streets leading to it; there was also a party of the foot guards, who were stationed in the court of Carlton-house, in white gaiters, with the band of the 3d regt. in their state uniform, who played God save the King, when the Dukes of Kent and Gloucester entered the court yard in state.

Soon after two o'clock the Prince Regent gave audiences to his Royal Highness the Duke of York, as commander in chief, the Lord Chancellor, and Earl Fitzwilliam. His Royal Highness then left his private apartment, attended by the Earl of Moira, Lords Dundas, Keith, Colonel M'Mahon, General Turner, Colonel Bloomfield, &c. &c. and proceeded to the state room, where the Algerine and Portuguese Ambassadors, the American, and other ministers, had the honor of conversing and paying their respects to his Royal Highness, as had also the ministers and officers of state. His Royal Highness then proceeded to hold the general levee.

That your petitioners have been forcibly interrupted in the constitutional exercise of their chartered right to petition the two houses of Parliament—and the public and humiliating dispersion of their body menaced and attempted.

That the imbecility which retracted what rashness had designed, can in no degree palliate, much less excuse, a studied, deliberate, and wanton insult, offered to five millions of his Majesty's loyal subjects.

That we therefore humbly entreat your Royal Highness will cause an enquiry to be instituted into the nature of the private evidence, on which the issue of the circular letter from the Irish Government and its consequent proceedings have been alleged to have been grounded; and in the event of no such evidence appearing (a fact we strongly and confidently assume, and which the openness of one character, the candour of our nature, and the almost ostentatious publicity of our proceedings, justify us in doing, and thus indignant and warmly repelling a charge vitally aimed at our loyalty and our honour). We further pray, that your Royal Highness will be graciously pleased to remove Charles Lenox, Duke of Richmond, Lord Lieut.-Gen. and Governor-Gen. of Ireland, and Right Hon. William W. Pole, his secretary, from your councils.

And your petitioners will ever pray.
