THE KING.

Windsor Castle, June 2, 1811.

His Majesty has had some fresh accession to his dis-
order, but it does not appear to be increasing.

Tuesday last being the anniversary of his Majesty's
Birth-Day, when our most gracious Sovereign entered
upon the 74th year of his age, it was observed in this
city with the usual demonstration of joy.

Appearances in the north of Europe are very war-
like. Prussia is aiming as fast as possible, and it is
said, at the expense of France, 20,000 French troops
are employed at the works about Dantzic.

We are sorry to learn, that lieut.-col. Cameron, of
the 79th regiment, died on the 13th inst. of the wound
he received in the action at Fuentes d'Onor, being
shot through the neck by a musquet-ball. Lord Wel-
llington sent his own surgeon to attend him—and after
his death attended the funeral in company with many
General officers, and the whole of his Lordship's per-
sonal staff.

Tuesday last, Michael Funnell, Esq. a magistrate of
this county, committed to jail William Bourk, charged
with others for the murder of Thos. Shaugnessy, at
Friarstown, on the 31st of last month.

Yesterday, by Edward Nash, Esq. Edmond Byrns,
of Garryfin in this county, charged with burning a
large stack of forage and faggots, the property of a
gentleman in that neighbourhood.

The Knight of Kerry, we are sorry to learn was
prevented by serious indisposition, from attending the
discussion of the catholic question on Friday last.

The Tralee Infantry, commanded by Captain Chute,
have subscribed three days of their quarterly pay to the
fund for the relief of the suffering Portuguese.

Saturday night, a dreadful fire broke out in an ex-
tensive malt-store, belonging to Messrs. Beamish and
Crawford, in Mary-street, Cork, which raged with such
violence that the entire concern, together with the
stock of malt and barley, were consumed. Great ap-
prehensions were entertained for the safety of the Saint
Patrick's Porter Brewery, and some houses on Sullivan's
Quay, but we are happy to find they sustained no inju-
ry; the stores were insured, but the stock was not.

We understand that nearly half the royal Dublin city
regiment have volunteered their services to Great Bri-
tain.

The royal Cornwall regiment of militia stationed at
King'sbridge, have to a man, volunteered their services
for Ireland.

On Tuesday last, the Sligo militia quartered in this
city, volunteered their services to any part of the
Globe.

Upwards of 10,000 infantry, it is said, are to be im-
mediately sent to Portugal.

The 2d battalion of the 35th regiments, at present at
Shorncliffe, is ordered to hold itself in readiness to
embark for Jersey, in the place of a regiment ordered
from thence to Portugal.

Orders have been received for two companies of the
1st battalion of the 71st regiment, at Deal, to be im-
mediately completed to 100 rank and file each from
the 2d bat.; also, that 150 more shall be transferred to
the 1st bat. and the whole held in readiness to march
at a moment's notice to Portsmouth, in order to em-
bark for Portugal.

The 1st or royal dragoons, 16th and 14th light dra-
goons, who again so eminently distinguished themselves
against so superior a force of the enemy's cavalry near
Almeida had 200 horses killed and wounded in the
three last hard fought battles.

The Dutch battalion of the 60th regiment (the 1st)
has embarked at Portsmouth for the Cape of Good

In the law recently enacted on the subject of the
Slave Trade, the convicted Slave Trader is subjected
by this law either to transportation for 14 years, or to
imprisonment and hard labour in the hulks or elsewhere
for 5 years, and in this punishment all those are made
to participate, who being the natural born subjects of
his Majesty wherever they may reside or residing in
any part of his Majesty's dominions, whatever may
have been their native country, either directly or indi-
rectly, carry on, or assist in carrying on this detestable
traffic. An exception is made in favour of West India
proprietors, who may still transfer slaves from one
hand to the another within the islands, provided they
have not been imported contrary to law, that is to say
provided they have not been imported subsequently to
the 1st of Jan. 1808; for if they have, they are by law
entitled to their freedom. Another exception is made
in favour of common seamen or servants who assist in
trade. If such persons shall, within three months after
their arrival at any port in his Majesty's dominions, in-
form against the principals in the crime to which they
have been parties, so that such principals may be pro-
secuted to conviction, then they will be delivered from
the penal consequence to which they would otherwise
have been exposed. All persons insuring or causing to
be insured any property embarked in the Slave Trade,
are punishable with two years imprisonment. And it is
to be observed, that the pecuniary penalties and forfei-
tures to which, not only underwriters and brokers, but
all persons engaging in the Slave Trade, are liable by
the former abolition acts, remain in full force.
