tract craunope's bill, moved in the House of Lords, for preventing the calamity of changes, fluctuations, and uncertainties in the circulating medium, passed the house on Monday night last, by a majority of nearly TRREE to ONE.

It is said, that instead of the present allowance to King's ships, in harbour, of seven pints per man, of small beer, half the quantity is to be allowed of strong

Lord Stanhope's bill having excited so large a share of the public interest, we lay a report of it before our readers, as it passed the house of lords.

A hill intituled, an act for making more effectual provision for preventing the current gold coin of the realm from being paid or accepted for a greater value than the current value of such coin; for preventing any note or notes of the governor and company of the bank of England from being received for any smaller sum than the sum therein specified; and for staying Proceedings upon any distress by tender of such notes.

Whereas it is expedient to enact as is herein after provided: Be it enacted by the King's most excellent Majests, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons in the present Parliament assembled, and by the anthority of the same, that from and after the passing of this act, no person shall receive or pay for any gold coin lawfully current within the realm, any more in value, beneuit. profit, or advantage, than the true lawful value of such coin, whether such value, benefit, profit or advantage be paid, made or taken in lawful money, er in any note or notes, bill or bills of the governor and company of the bank of England, or in any silver token or tokens issued by the said governor and company, or by any or all of the said means wholly or by any device, shift, or contrivance whatsoever.

And be it further concled, by the authority aforesaid, that no person shall by any device, shift or contrivance, whatsoever, receive or pay any note or notes. bill or bills of the said governor and company of the bank of England, as of less value in money, except lawful discount than the sum expressed therein, to be

thereby made so payable.

And be it enacted, by the authority aforesaid, that in case any person shall proceed by distress to recover from any tenant or other person liable to such distress, any rent or sum of money-due from such tenent, or other person, it shall be lawful for such tenant or other person, in every such case, to tender notes of the governor and company of the bank of England, expressed to be payable on demand, to the amount and in discharge of such rent or sum so due to the person on whose behalf such distress is made, or to the officer or person making such distress on his behalf; and in case such tender shall be accepted, or in case such tender shall be made and refused, the goods taken in such distress shall be forthwith returned to the party distrained upon, unless the party distraining and refusing to accept such tender shall insist that a greater sum is due than the sum so tendered, and in such case the parties shall proceed as usual in such eases; but if it shall appear that no more was due than the sum so tendered, the party who tendered such sum, shall be entitled to the costs of all subsequent proceedings. Provided always, that the person to whom such rent or sum of money is due, shall have & be entitled to such other remedies for the recovery thereof, exclusive of distress, as such person had or was entitled to at the time of making such distress, if such person shall not think proper to accept such tender so made as aforesaid: Provided also, that nothing herein contained shall affect the right of any tenant, or other such person as aforesaid having such right, to replevy the goods taken in distress, in case, without making such tender as aforesaid, he shall

Provided always, and be it further enacted, that this act snall be in force to and until the 25th day of March,

Lord STANHODE's bill having passed the Lords, was brought forward in the House of Commons on Tuesday lasi, by Mr. Perceval, when it produced a long debate. it was opposed by Mr. Abererombie, Lord Archibald Hamilton, Mr. Whitbread. Mr. Banks, Sir F. Burdett, and Mr. Tierney: and supported by Messrs. Baring and Manning, two bank directors, and Sir C. Burrell.

Upon a division there appeared

Majority 45 Two motions were afterwards made by Mr. Tierney; the one, that the second reading should be postponed until Monday the 22d inst. and that the house should be called over on that day. The other, that a select committee should be formed to inquire into the effects of the restriction since 1797. Both were negatived, and the second reading was fixed for next Monday.
