CAPTURE OF THE FRENCH FLEET BY SIR CHARLES COTTON.

The authority appears unexceptionable. It was communicated by Col. Austin, the Governor of Algarve, to Lord Wellington—Colonel Austin has boats, frequently plying between Algarve and Cadiz, and in a return of one of his barges received the account. Lord Wellington immediately transmitted it to Mr. Stewart, the account states that Sir C. Cotton had fallen in with the Toulon fleet, consisting of 9 or 10 sail of the line, 3 frigates, and 3 corvettes, with 9000 troops on board, armed *en flute*; and that an engagement had taken place, which terminated in the capture of them.—It was supposed they were destined for the Bay of Rosas, in order to try and retake Figueiras. Coming from such various sources there is every reason to confide in the fact.

HIS MAJESTY.

We are extremely concerned to announce that, the latest accounts received from Windsor, are peculiarly unfavourable; the bulletin of Sunday last, is as follows:—

“His Majesty has had a fresh accession of his disorder.”

Windsor-castle, July 18.”

“Signed as usual.”

A few days ago, a person of the name of *Thos. Hanrohan*, came to the Hotel of Mr. L. O'Donnell, in Clare-street, and seemed, disposed to remain for some time. On the day of his arrival and for some days after, several persons of the lower order waited upon him, and were at intervals closeted with him in such a mysterious way as naturally excited the suspicion of his host. Yesterday he called for his bill, and gave a three guinea Nenagh note, to pay its amount; but Mrs. O'Donnell, in her husband's absence, not being able to supply the change, he requested her to keep it as he intended to stay for some days; the note on being offered for change, proved to be a very well executed forgery on the bank of Messrs. Going, Bankers in Nenagh. The delinquent was immediately secured, and on his person were found 216 guineas, in three guinea notes of that bank, and eight thirty shilling forgeries on the Clonmel bank of Messrs. Rial, which bear no proportion in point of execution to those on the bank of Nenagh.—He has been fully committed for trial, and though the public by his detection, have been put upon their guard against receiving such notes in future payments it is much to be feared, that from the number of his accomplices, many of them have already got into circulation.

1. In the genuine Nenagh note, in the lower part of the capital B in the text word Bank, there are two little horizontal strokes or ornaments, which in the forgery are omitted.

2. When comparing the first line of the genuine note with the forgery, the two letters H in the word Bill, are extended beyond those in the forgery.

3. Under the letter P in Post, there are two small diagonal strokes from right to left, which are also omitted in the forgery.

4. In the word Sterling, there are two horizontal strokes across the centre omitted in the forgery.

5. In the genuine notes, the letter d in the word Received, terminates with a flourished hair stroke and a period or full point, both of which are omitted in the forgery.

6. In the genuine notes, over the first stroke of the word Nenagh (in text), there is a continued flourished line, which in the forgeries is left open, and ornamented in the opening with three distinct dots. In the capital N in the same word, the dart is omitted in the forgery.

7. In the article the (next succeeding the word Nenagh), the hair stroke in front of the t is omitted in the forgery.

We have considered it our duty to the public to be thus minutely explicit, to prepare them to resist any future attempts at imposition, which probably may be made by many of the gang, who no doubt are employed in circulating these forgeries, which are, not-
