The 99th regiment, of which the Hon. Gen. Matthew
is colonel, has been by order of the Regent, styled the
99th, or Prince of Wales's Tipperary regiment.

The Hon. Major-General W. Stewart, brother of the
Earl of Galloway, who was wounded at the battle of
Barrosa, is expected home in the course of the ensuing
week.

Saturday se'night, the Middlesex militia were re-
viewed at Portsmouth, by Generals Vandeleur and Win-
yard, previous to their proceeding to Ireland.

The Earl of Clare has been appointed an ensign in
the Royal County of Limerick regiment of militia, at
present quartered in Athlone.

On Wednesday last, Colonel Young commanding the
Royal Dublin militia, stationed at Castlebar, received
an order from the Commander in Chief to hold the re-
giment in immediate readiness for England.

On Friday morning last, a meeting took place, with-
in a short distance of Ballinasloe, between Lieutenant
K——y and Lient. L——e, of the Queen's County
regiment, when, after exchanging shots, happily with-
out effect, the matter was amicably terminated, by the
friends of both the parties.

An edict, which has naturally produced a strong sen-
sation in France, has been kept out of the public jour-
nals, by which no heiress possessed of the income of
6000 francs per annum (about 250l.) is to be allowed
to marry without the consent of the Emperor. It is
understood that such marriages are to be confined to
the military, unless by special indulgence.

Two young women of the names of Ann Hearle and
Ann Simkins, have been sentenced to seven years trans-
portation at the Exeter Quarter Sessions, for throwing
oil of vitriol on the clothes of another young woman,
named Elizabeth Wiam.

WEXFORD, AUG. 1.

The following prisoners have been tried and found
guilty :

- James Murphy, for the murder of Patrick Devereux,
to be executed this day.
- Martin Murphy, for sheep stealing—guilty—Death
- Nicholas Nixon, for aiding his brother George to
escape from gaol; fined £20, and to be imprisoned 3
months.
- Archibald Wood, for stealing four keys, the property
of John Redmond, Esq. pleaded guilty. To be burnt in
the hand, and transported for seven years.
- Isaac Wood entered into recognizance, himself in
£100, and two sureties in £50 each, to keep the peace
towards all his Majesty's subjects, and particularly to
Walter and John Redmond, Esqrs. for the space of 14
years. He was then arraigned for a burglary in the
house of John Redmond, Esq. and there being no pro-
secution was acquitted.

WATERFORD, AUG. 3.

Yesterday, at noon, the Hon. Judge Osborne, arrived
in this city from Wexford. He was soon followed by
the Hon. the Solicitor-General, and at two o'clock, the
Honourable Justices proceeded to St. Patrick's Hall,

gave security for their future good behaviour.
Mary M'Mahon and Mary Smith convicted of steal-
ing 10 yards of white fustian, the property of Thos.
Wright, on the 26th ult. at Monaghan. These women
had been tried the first day of the assizes for shop lift-
ing, of which they were acquitted and immediately dis-
charged, and a few hours after enlargement they com-
mitted the felony of which they are convicted.—To be
imprisoned six months each.

ARMAGH ASSIZES.

On Tuesday last the assizes commenced at Armagh,
the Hon. Baron George, in the crown court, and the
Hon. Chief Baron in the civil court.

We have not yet received a detail of the proceed-
ings at these assizes, but we hear sentence of death
has been pronounced on two men for uttering forged
bank notes.

After many "hair breadth escapes," our Assizes
which terminated this day has proved Maiden, though,
the number of persons that stood charged with crimi-
nal offences had swelled our Jail Kalendar to an un-
usual length. The business in the Record court was
lighter than usual. But *opposition* manifested itself at
the close of the week. For taxation not being confined
to the financial talents of our Chancellor of the Exche-
quer, the farmers grumbled at the demands made to
"make and repair our roads, and which is generally,
and perhaps not improperly designated Jobs. This levy
exceeded in the present instance £25,300!!! But,
being resisted by *traverse*, the object of numbers was
frustrated, and many good natured souls have felt disap-
pointed in their anxious solicitude to—*mend our ways.*

suddenly on Saturday last at Richmond (near London.)
