That the Prince Regent is among the number who look with favour upon them, there is little reason to doubt. If the thing is problematical, as his new born friends at the Castle would insinuate—inference from past general conduct affords no infallible guide in judging of the human disposition of a Prince

By the arrival of the New Brunswick, Capt. Glanville, in Cork harbour on Thursday night, we are favored with the following interesting extract of a letter from a most respectable merchant in Lisbon to his correspondent in that city.

LISBON, JULY 15, 1811.

"Notwithstanding the Siege of Badajoz being a second time raised and our army retreating to Portugal, no fears are entertained.

"Our army is now going into cantonments and the the French remain inactive in Estremadura—nothing of consequence is likely to be accomplished this summer.

"General Graham is arrived here from Cadiz to join our army, owing to his disagreement with the Spaniards since the battle of Barrosa. We are daily receiving strong reinforcements, and nothing can be apprehended from any attack the French may make."

Charles Mahon jun. Esq. is appointed pay-master to the Clare regiment of militia, vice Daxon resigned.

The Sligo regiment quartered at Rathkeale, &c. in this county, has received a letter of readiness to proceed for England.

Friday a signal was made at Cove for a man of war, supposed to have transports with some militia regts. on board from England.

Last week, in consequence of a trifling dispute, which took place at the mess the preceding evening, a meeting took place in a field at Ferrybank, between Lieuts. Mayberry and Sarsfield of the Kerry militia. After receiving his antagonist's fire, Lieut. Mayberry discharged his pistol in the air. The seconds then interfered and the parties became reconciled.

On Friday week a most melancholy accident occurred at Lisskelly, near Ballinasloe; a young man, who had been, with some others, employed in building bay into large field cocks, attempted when one of them was completed, to come to the ground, by sliding by the side of the cock; but a pitchfork being unfortunately placed, with the point upwards, in the very spot where he was descending, shocking to relate, it entered the lower part of his belly, and he died in less than two hours in the most excruciating torture.

On Tuesday last the first division of the Carlow regt. and on the two following days the remaining divisions marched into Mullingar from Derry. It is said that they are only to remain there to do duty until the arrival of an English militia regiment, and then proceed to Cork or Dublin for immediate embarkation. It is confidently reported that the Surrey militia, is the regt. destined for these quarters.

The Cardigan militia, consisting of 800 men, are to form part of the garrison at Limerick.

The North Mayo militia have left Clononey barracks for Dublin, where they are to embark for England.
