vide to prepare a petition to the King, or to Parlia- ment, or to publish notices of such election or to act "bona fide" in the character of Delegates for such purposes, and such purposes only.

"I should consider the provisions of the Convention Act, as levelled solely against assemblies, associated under pretence of petitioning, but really and in fact having other objects in contemplation, and pursuing such objects; and I would not infer the illegal motive or pursuit from the mere delegated character.

"And if I doubted as to this construction from the mere perusal of the preamble and enacting clauses (which appear to me to be very obscure) all doubt would be removed by the last section, which provides that nothing herein contained shall be construed in any manner to prevent or impede the undoubted right of his Majesty's subjects of this Realm to petition, &c." I should consider this proviso as leaving the right, and the exercise of the right of petitioning precisely as they stood before the Act: and knowing as I do, that the appointment of Delegates might, in many imagina- ble cases, facilitate the exercise of that right, I could not but consider that right as impeded by an universal and unqualified prohibition to exercise it through the medium of Delegates."

"Such still continues to be my opinion: and I cannot relinquish it upon authority, which, though high and respectable, is not judicial or binding: and the grounds of which I cannot even imagine."

"I consequently would not advise a Magistrate to disperse any body of men assembled to elect Delegates such as I have described: and if any information upon oath should be produced to him against such persons, I would not advise him to grant any warrant to arrest them, unless such facts (as would warrant an inference and not merely a suspicion, that the persons so dele- gated had other objects in view) shall be positively and distinctly sworn to."

HAYTI.

By the brig Hornet, Capt. Adams, from St. Domingo, papers and copies of decrees of the Haytian chief have been received.

An edict of the King of the 20th April, creates a royal and military order, under the denomination of St. Henry. This order, of which the King is chief, is to consist of the Prince Royal, 16 of the grand cross, 32 commanders, and as many chevaliers, as the King shall think proper to appoint.—Profession of the catholic religion is essential to admission. Its endowment is 300,000 livres, divided among the members according to rank.

An edict of the 7th April, erects an Archbishop in the capital of Hayti, and bishoprics in various cities.

An edict of the 6th May, regulates the establishment of the military house of the King consisting of 250 body guards, three companies of light horse, viz. the King's, Queen's, and the Prince Royal's.

An edict of the 12th May regulate the domestic establishment.

An ordinance prohibiting foreign merchants established in the kingdom, from selling by retail the car- goes consigned on them.

A letter from Plymouth Dock, dated the 16th inst. says—"A large French privateer had the audacity to come close in shore off this port to-day, and at twelve o'clock she captured two homeward bound West India- men, within sight of the shore and signal stations; and it is feared has got off with them to the French coast."
