John Latouche Hume, Esq. having taken the chair, thanks of the Jury were given to their worthy Foreman for his liberal and constitutional conduct on all occasions.

The *Dublin Evening Herald*, of the 16th inst. gives the following account of an attack on the Rev. Wm. Steele Dickson, Presbyterian Pastor of Keady, and a gentleman approaching his 70th year of age:—"On Monday evening last, as the Rev. Wm. Steele Dickson was returning from the catholic meeting at Armagh, before whom he had made a brilliant and impressive play of unequalled talent, and liberal christianlike sentiment, he was most treacherously way-laid, about a mile from that town, dragged from his horse, and taken in the most cruel and inhuman manner. When the ruffians thought they had effectually perpetrated their bloody purpose, they threw the hapless object of their fury into a deep ditch, whence he was conveyed in the most dangerous state, to his distracted family." As the Duke of Cumberland, General Linsengen, and several officers were riding through Ipswich, after the view, three young men in a gig drove furiously into the midst of them, and the shaft of the gig went 13 feet into the body of the General's horse, and slightly wounded his Royal Highness's leg. The horse died immediately after.

On Monday the 16th inst. Mr. Edward Plummer, formerly commander of the Mason revenue cutter, put an end to his existence, by shooting himself through the head with a pistol at his lodgings in Tralee. An inquest was the next day held on the body, when it appeared that the deceased had been for some time previous in a very unsettled state of mind, and the Jury returned a verdict that his death was occasioned by having shot himself.

On Friday se'night two labourers who had been employed on board a ship laden with spirits at one of the quays of Cork, took an opportunity to broach one of the casks, and by means of a straw or quill, to drink to such an excess of its contents, that one of them expired the same evening, and the other remains in a state, that little hopes are entertained of his recovery.

On Monday week a gentleman was returning to his place of residence near Bandon, he observed about eight miles of the Bandon road from this city, a number of country people running a cross the fields as if they were engaged in eager pursuit. Shortly after a person of the name of Scott, who is tythe proctor, came hopping along the road, and while pressing forward with all possible expedition a shot was fired at him from behind the hedge which killed the horse he was riding, on the spot. The observer of this ferocious transaction found it expedient to avoid a scene of so much outrage and danger, and as the crowd was advancing with menacing speed he pushed forward on his journey. *Cork Intelligencer.*

On Wednesday a man named William Abern, against whom informations had been sworn about 12 years ago for the murder of Bartholomew Harrington, at Ballinshig, in the liberties of Cork, was drinking in a house at the Ferry-point, Passage, having returned from England but the day before, when the Rev. R. Lloyd a magistrate for the county, who heard of the circumstances on investigating an assault that happened between Abern's brother and another man, went to the house, attended by Mr. John Lancaster, of Passage, and Mr. Lloyd's servant, and immediately secured him; and on the brother of the deceased, whom Mr. Lloyd sent for some distance, having identified him, he transmitted him to the Mayor of Cork, under an escort from the Cork Barracks, to be fully committed for trial.

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By a private letter from an officer in one of our line of battle ships off Flushing, we find, that three of the enemy's ships (one carrying the commander-in-chief's flag) came out on Wednesday last to reconnoitre our advanced line; when Captain Hancock, who commands the in-shore squadron consisting of the Nymph frigate and a few brigs, immediately attacked them, and compelled them to return to their former anchorage. It was the opinion of the officer from whom this intelligence is derived, that the repulse of these three ships must be attributed to their unprepared state to return to port without any effect, little expecting, probably, such temerity from a single frigate, and being apprehensive, lest, by exposing their ships to the hazard of losing a spar, their return to port might be impeded, excepting with a strong tide; in the interval of which, one of our line of battle ships could have worked up to them, the result of which, it is added, "the enemy were too well aware of." It was the opinion in the fleet, that the enemy would endeavour to elude us during the present easterly winds; and in consequence of their late movements, the whole of our fleet has gone closer in; so that we may, perhaps, look for important news from this station.
