Yesterday, being the 51st anniversary of our much
revered and beloved Sovereign's coronation, was ob-
served here with the usual demonstration of joy. At
eleven o'clock, the royal standard of England was
hoisted at the main on board the Admiral's flag-ship

royal salute.

SEPT. 25.—Yesterday arrived his Majesty's ship Stork
Captain Legeyt, from Plymouth, which place she left
on Saturday. She is expected to sail hence for Loughs-
willy.

By Major Trevanion, who came passenger in her, on
his way to join his regiment at Derry, we informed,
that on Friday before he sailed from Plymouth, the
Admiral's Secretary told him that a vessel had arrived
there, the master of which says, that he saw his Majes-
ty's frigate Melampus, 36 guns. Capt. Hawker, tew-
ing into Halifax the United States frigate President, 44
guns, Commodore Rogers. From what particulars are
known, it appears that on the two frigates falling in
with each other, the President fired three shots at the
Melampus, on which she poured a treble shotted broad-
side into the American Commodore, which killed be-
tween 50 or 60 of the American crew, besides being
very destructive to the hull and rigging of the Presi-
dent.
