Petersburgh to the 1st, and from Copenhagen to the
11th inst. with advices from other situations in the Bal-
tic, of more recent dates.

The exchange at Petersburgh was from 14 to 14½,
and trade was in a state of greater activity than it ap-
pears to have been by the intelligence of the preceding
mail. The letters from other part of the Baltic are
less positive than the former on the subject of war,
and not a syllable is said of the movements of the Prus-
sian armies, or of the commotions in Pomerania. One
letter from Stockholm says, "We have strong fears of
a Continental War." A letter from Wingoe Sound an-
nounces the sailing of the homeward-bound fleet, on
the 15th inst. consisting of about 120 ships.

Preparations are making at Rotterdam for the arri-
val of Bonaparte.

We have received Halifax papers, with others from
New-York and Boston, the former to the 31st ult. and
latter eight days earlier. The first contain a great num-
ber of addresses from various parts of British America
to Sir George Prevost and General Hunter, anterior
to their sailing in the Melampus frigate, on the 31st
August.

The Boston Patriot of the 22d ult. inserts the subse-
quent article:

"The President is at his seat in Montpelier; Mr. Mun-
roe, secretary of state, at Richmond; Mr. Gallatin,
secretary of the treasury, at New York; Mr. Hamilton
secretary of the navy, Carolina; Mr. Curtis, secretary
of war, at other quarters than the head-quarters of
Government; Mr. Granger, at his post office, looking
out for breakers; Mr. Serrurier, the French Minister,
either an inmate in the President's family, or a next door
neighbour; Mr. Foster, the British Minister, at Phila-
delphia. This is all well enough in time of peace and
national prosperity!! Hail Columbia, happy land!"

Whatever may be the opinion of the American Edi-
tors, influenced by party prepossessions, the e can be
no doubt that Mr. Maddison and his coadjutors in office,
will not come to any arrangement with the British Mi-
nister until after the meeting of Congress, on the 4th
November, and we can expect to hear nothing decisive
as to our relations with the United States, until Christ-
mas.

A letter from an officer of high rank in the army of
Lord Wellington, dated at head-quarters the 4th inst.
states, that the whole army was then concentrated in
the neighbourhood of Ciudad Rodrigo, and that the
meditated grand operation could not be many days de-
layed, from the difficulty that must naturally be ex-
perienced in providing the necessary forage for the im-
mense number of fine cavalry which had just arrived to
co-operate in the projected enterprise. The precise
nature of the operations about to be undertaken, the
writer does not pretend to be acquainted with; but he
expresses a persuasion from the formidable disposition
that had been made of our forces, that a general en-
gagement would very shortly take place.

Two mails arrived this morning from Anholt and He-
ligoland. The passengers from these places concur in
stating, that a war between Russia and France is ex-
pected to break out every day, and that the first blow
will be struck in Prussia, where the French troops are
said to be already in motion.
