The left, we understand, is not so much in advance upon Ciudad Rodrigo as it was before the occurrence of those conflicts. Of Gen. Hill's division, which is in the vicinity of the Tagus, we hear nothing in any of the accounts from Portugal.

All the disposable small craft at Plymouth have been ordered to be fitted out for immediate service with the greatest expedition.

We are extremely grieved to announce a most unhappy catastrophe which lately took place near Newry. The Rev. Vesey Dawson who had been the incumbent of a valuable living near that town, was travelling in a four wheeled carriage with his lady and family, when the horses took fright and ran off.—Mr. Dawson, opened the door, and endeavoured to spring out, when melancholy to relate, his coat was caught in the wheel, and his head falling forward, was crushed within the spokes.—In reading this dreadful calamity, the only consolation which we can offer to our readers is, that the ill-fated gentleman, was relieved from his sufferings by an instantaneous death.
