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THE ARMY.

The 37th regiment (1000 strong) have got orders to embark at Cork, (where they have been stationed some time,) for Bristol—from thence, it is supposed, they will proceed to join Lord Wellington's army.

All the Medical Staff that can be spared from the Home Service, are ordered to hold themselves in readiness to embark for Portugal. The inference drawn from this is, that sickness is very prevalent in our army some accounts state the number as high as 17,000, many of these are however, slight cases, arising from change of food and climate, particularly as it regards the reinforcements lately sent out.

On Thursday, the Inverness Highland militia, com- manded by Major Tulloch, quartered at Geopost, gave a very elegant entertainment to the North Cork militia, to which many of the officers of the Dublin and Lime- rick regiments were invited with Gen. Porter and suite, Sir J. Gardner, &c.

The City of Dublin militia have also given a most sumptuous and elegant entertainment to General Por- ter and the officers of the Inverness, Wiltshire, and Cork regiments, when all vied in cordiality and good humour.

When the Roscommon and King's County regiments were reviewed at Plymouth on Monday, Gen. Thomas was so struck with the spirited manner in which they advanced to the charge of bayonets, in 7 double quick time, that he requested their officers to put them again through the movement, declaring that he had never seen any thing to equal it. The King's co. regiment have marched to Maidstone, in Kent.

Friday se'night two transports, with the remainder of the Tipperary militia, about 500, arrived at Cha- tham. One of the privates fell from a transport in the dock-yard, and was unfortunately drowned.
