It had been recently intended, at the suggestion of
some distinguished persons, to call county meetings
to express the opinions of the Protestants on the great
question of catholic emancipation. We understand
that course has been given up for the preferable one of
a Petition from the protestants of Ireland—by which
means, the agitation attending large meetings will be
avoided, and the sense of the property of Ireland ex-
pressed in the most convincing and unequivocal manner.
A Petition has been prepared for the purpose; it is
moderate and judiciously drawn up; it avoids every
topic of irritation, and steers clear of all party and po-
litics.

There can be no doubt that it will emphatically speak
the general sense of the landed and commercial prop-
erty of the Protestants, and, beyond any thing which has
yet occurred, tend to harmonize the feelings of this
country, and give confidence and security to the Em-
pire.

The first name to the above mentioned Petition is
that of the Right Hon. David Latouch, followed by
the signatures of several others of that most respectable
family. We have also observed the names of the Right
Hon. Henry Grattan, Lords Meath and Lismore, the
Hon. James Butler.

It is said that the Marquis of Tavistock, son to the
Duke of Bedford, intends to draw the attention of the
House of Commons to the state of the Irish Catholics.

We feel pleasure in stating that Mr. Bourne has agreed
to the renewal of a new contract, by which means the
public will have the advantage of receiving their letters,
at a much earlier hour than at present, and they will
also have a longer time allowed for answering them.—
The arrival of the Dublin coach in this city will be at
4 o'clock, P. M. and departure at 10 o'clock, A. M. By
these regulations our county Clare friends will benefit
much, as the coach from this city will take the mail to
Bouis, and arrive at 8 o'clock in the evening, and will
start from Ennis at 6 o'clock in the morning, so as to
be in Limerick before the Dublin coach sets off.

The Admiralty has given orders for six horse trans-
ports to sail from Portsmouth, for Cork, to take on
board a detachment of the royal artillery drivers' corps,
for the army under Lord Wellington.
