

Mr. Kemmis opened the pleadings, and the Attorney General having addressed the Court and Jury, Mr. Huddleston & a police constable were examined, when the court adjourned. The next day a clerk from the head police office was examined, which closed the proceedings on behalf of the Crown, when Mr. Burrowes, as leading Counsel for the traverser, addressed the Court on a point of law, which if the Court were of opinion was founded, would have gone to the quashing of the indictment. Mr. Burrowes and Mr. Perrin were heard on one side, and the Attorney and Solicitor General on the other. Should the Court pronounce against the argument of Mr. Burrowes, it was expected that he would then address the Jury on the law and the facts involved in the traverser's case; and that no witness would be called. In our next we shall continue this interesting trial in full detail.

CLARE CATHOLIC MEETING.—This meeting took place on Monday last, at the court house, in Ennis.
