A PROCLAMATION.—RICHMOND, &c.

WHEREAS we have received information upon oath, that Michael Glynn of Ringsend, in the county of the city of Dublin, carpenter, and James Fisher of Sandymount, in the said city, have been concerned in a treasonable conspiracy, and have been members of an association, or society, instituted and formed for treasonable purposes.

And whereas the said Michel Glynn and Jas. Fisher have fled from justice:

Now we the Lord Lieutenant and Privy Council being determined, as far as in us lies, to maintain the public peace, and to bring to justice the promoters, aiders, and abettors of the said unlawful association, do hereby offer a reward of Two Hundred Pounds to any person or persons who shall, within six months from the date hereof, discover the said Michael Glynn and J. Fisher, or either of them, so as that they or either of them may be apprehended and committed to prison.

And we do further publish and declare, that if any person or persons shall, within the time aforesaid, discover any of the other persons who may become members of the said unlawful association, or who may have assisted in promoting or extending the same, or who shall from henceforth join in, abet, or promote such association; so as that such person or persons shall be convicted thereof, such person or persons so discovering and apprehending shall receive as a reward the sum of One Hundred Pounds sterling for each and every of the first three persons so apprehended and convicted.

And we do hereby strictly charge and command all justices of the peace, mayors, sheriffs, bailiffs, and all other his Majesty's loving subjects to use their utmost endeavours to bring the said offenders, and every of them, to speedy and condign punishment.
