FRENCH FLEET OFF CORK.

We have just learned from unquestionable authority, that a French Fleet has been discovered off Cork. This intelligence has been conveyed by an express from Cork, to General Montresor, commanding this district. At this late hour, we have not time for turther particulars-if the above is correct, we hope shortly to have the pleasure to congratulate our country, on their meeting the usual fate of every hostile fleet that has hitherto presumed to menace the Heaven-defended shores of Brin.
