It appears that if these nails, hamed cannon nails, had been fixed in a manner similar to lyuch-plus in carriage wheels, this accident could not have happened; and this circumstance is certainly worth attention, that siufilar accidents may be in future prevented.

Thursday last afternoon, an old woman, in the village of the Wather of Leith, about 70 years of age, was sitting at her fire-side, when, falling asleep, her clothes caught fire, and she was so much burned that she expired before nine o'clock at night.
