What ignorance do many of our country courts display at this moment! Is this a time to introduce intolerant doctrines, and constructions of these statutes unauthorised by precedents drawn from the period in which they were enacted?

On this subject THE GLOBE says—"When Lord Castlereagh agreed last week to accept the seals of the War Department, stipulated that he should be at perfect liberty to vote for the Catholic claims, without offending his colleagues in the Cabinet. He also stipulated, at the same time, for a full pardon for Mr. O'Dell,* who had sinned against Mr. Perceval, and was threatened, in consequence of this heavy crime, with the loss of his place, as one of the Lords of the Irish Treasury, which he now fills. When we consider the severity with which the friends of the catholic cause have been hitherto visited by Ministerial vengeance, we anticipate an happy result, however distant, from the present concession—confident, that, to be ultimately crowned with success, the catholic question requires only fair play."
