 and respectable meeting took place at the Commercial
 Buildings, pursuant to the Catholic Requisition in a
 preceding column.

Our gallant fellow-citizen, Sir Michael Seymour,
 Bart. has been appointed from the La Niemen frigate
 of 44 guns, to the Hannibal of 74 guns, at Spithead.—
 We cannot help considering it a circumstance of pride
 and exultation, that Limerick has given birth to this
 Hero, who has so gallantly fought the battles of his
 country—and so pre-eminently distinguished himself
 when opposed against the enemy on every occasion.

Since the commencement of our Assizes, the follow-
 ing person were tried and convicted,

In the city court—Mary Tubbs, for stealing several
 articles from Major Charles Stroud, of the Hertford-
 shire militia—to be confined six months and burned on
 the hand.

John Halloran for forgery—to be pillored on Mon-
 day next.

In the county court—William Harty, for the mur-
 der of Patrick Coffey at the fair of Cloggan, last Sept.—
 to be hanged this day and his body to be given for
 dissection.—Just as the unfortunate man was taking
 out this morning for execution, the Sheriff received a
 respite for him until further orders.

John Ryan, Mich. Kennedy, Patrick Finn, and John
 Kennedy, for a riot—to be confined one month, and to
 pay a fine of £10 each.

Catherine Sweeny, for assaulting a woman, by which
 she miscarried—to be imprisoned one month.

John Burke, for the murder of Thos. Shaughnessy,
 convicted of manslaughter—to be burned on the hand,
 and imprisoned twelve months.

John Leonard, for cow and pig stealing—to be trans-
 ported for seven years.

Cornelius Keating, for breaking out of the bride well
 at Rathkeale—sentence not known.

John Carroll, for a riot—to be confined one month,
 and pay a fine of £5.

William Harty, for an assault—to be transmitted to
 Clonmel, to be tried for highway robbery.

John Gleeson, for a riot—to be confined six months.

John Hogan, for attacking the house of Pat. Drew,
 at Rockfield, by night—to be transported for 7 years.

Patrick Heffernan, for breaking open the house of
 Patrick Sheahan, and forcibly taking away his daugh-
 ter—sentenced to be hanged on Saturday, 4th April.

John Ryan, for the murder of Richard Rowley, con-
 victed of manslaughter—to be burned on the hand, and
 imprisoned twelve months.

Patrick Cooney, for a burglary and felony, at the
 house of William Sheehy—to be hanged on Saturday,
 the 4th April next.

Several persons were arraigned for the murder of
 Philip Sheahan, at Shanagolden; but their trials were
 postponed by the crown.

The North East circuit commenced on Saturday last
 in Drogheda, Mr. Justice Daly in the crown court—
 there being no civil business, Baron Smith did not sit.
 The Cavan assizes terminated on Friday last—there
 was no capital conviction; upwards of 60 persons were
 convicted of the offence of using unlicensed stills—
 the Judges were Baron McClelland, and Mr. Justice
 Osborne—they proceeded on the following day for
 Enniskillen. The assizes of Wicklow terminated on
 Friday last, and two persons have been sentenced to
 death—the Lord Chief Baron and Baron George were
 the Judges, and they proceeded on Saturday to open
 their commission in Wexford.

There are already no less than 40 prisoners on the
 calendar for trial, in the county jail of Galway, at the
 ensuing assizes.

The John and Mary, Walton, from Oporto to Cork,
 in ballast, was totally lost, the 26th ult. on the rocks of
 Broad Sound Sicily; crew saved. The Prince Regent
 Scott, from Cork, received damage at St. Ives, on
 Wednesday morning, in consequence of a great surf.—
 She must be unloaded. The Montague, Jefford, from
 Cork to London, is put into Hfcombe with the loss
 of bowsprit, and leaky, having been on shore, and it
 is supposed she must be unloaded.

There is a report very general in circulation, and

legislature, the executive, had expressed to the Duke
 of Bedford his concurrence in this wished for measure.
 He acknowledged he felt so much self concern in the
 present state of affairs, as to be sore at the idea, that
 were his abilities deserving of that degree of profes-
 sional advancement, it was not now in the power of
 Majesty to extend its prerogative so far as to appoint
 him counsel on a crown business. He next paid a
 handsome and highly applauded compliment to Earl
 Wellington and the army of Portugal, the great majori-
 ty of which, it was well known to the French Ruler, was
 composed of Irish Roman Catholics. It had been proved
 that a single British regiment, nine-tenths of which
 were Catholics, had defeated treble that number of the
 satellites of Bonaparte. The learned and eloquent
 speaker, represented the apprehension and unwilling-
 ness of the tyrant of Europe to expose his legions on
 these shores, if he understood they had to contend with
 the hardy peasantry of Ireland: fighting with hand and
 heart, in their own cause, and in league with a friendly
 government; that he was aware the bayonet would be
 found by him as irresistible in their hands here, as he
 has experienced it to be on the Continent. But if in-
 stead of cordiality and co-operation, he conceived dis-
 union and discord to be the portion of our people, then
 indeed would his apprehensions be changed into confi-
 dence and his destroying legions sent amongst us. He
 described the melancholy and afflicting situation of a
 country subjected to the wanton and insulting conduct
 of an unprincipled soldiery, and made it appear to be
 the interest of all sects to unite as one man, and by a
 return of proper members to Parliament, to secure the
 freedom of the British constitution, and resist the en-
 croachments of military despotism.

On the resolution respecting the Hon. Captain Stan-
 hope, Counsellor O'Gorman observed that that gentle-
 man had been repeatedly warned by persons high in
 authority, not to attend the Catholic meetings; but
 that such was his regard for honor and principle, that
 he slighted these warnings, and became the victim of
