A troop of the 6th dragoon guards arrived at Haddington, cavalry barracks on Wednesday, from Perth, and two other troops were expected the end of last week, or the beginning of this, from the west country, which will make in all four troops there for the usual exercise at this time of the year.

WATERFORD ASSIZES.

On Friday last, the Lord Chief Baron and Baron George arrived in Waterford from Wexford, and immediately proceeded to open their commissions as Judges of Assize, the former in the county and the latter in the city. The following are the convictions:

In the county—Thomas Curreen, charged with stealing a black mare from the lands of Tallagh—Guilty—Death.

John Brien, *alias* Captain Wheeler, charged with being the leader of the party who murdered Timothy and Mary Collins, at Ballygarron, on the 24th of last June—Guilty—Death.

Some prisoners were remanded, others held to bail, and six discharged by proclamation, which terminated the Spring Assizes for the county.

In the city—Thomas Kennagh, a private in the Coldstream guards, was arraigned for the murder of Mary Doherty, on the 5th January last, at Newrath. This man's case had excited a considerable degree of public attention, and the court was crowded to a degree rather uncommon. The prisoner is a remarkably handsome man of about 30 years of age, middle size, and of rather a genteel appearance. Upon coming to the bar he had a cheerful smiling air, which scarcely forsook him during the trial, which time he chiefly passed in reading a prayerbook. When called on to plead, he answered with a smile, *guilty*. The Judge then requested he would consider well the line of conduct which he was about to pursue, and told him that however sincere his contrition might be for having offended against the laws, it was more prudent in him to allow the laws to take their own course in vindicating themselves, and that he might find that they were not deficient in mercy. He replied, with good humour, mixed with resignation that he wanted no mercy "but the mercy of God," and persisted in his plea. The humane Judge renewed his request, and urged it strongly when the prisoner withdrew his first plea, and answered Not Guilty. The only witness called was

Michael Evelyn Esq. coroner, who proved that the body of a woman, with several marks of violence, was found at the period and in the place mentioned in the indictment, and that he held an inquest on the body, by adjournment from the 7th to the 13th January. He saw the prisoner afterwards in custody in the city jail. The prisoner, without the least suggestion of hope or fear, acknowledged himself to be the murderer, and said that he gave her the first blow with a stick, which Mr. E. shewed him, and now produced in court, and afterwards finished her with a stone. This stick he had received from one Munns, at Pilstown, at whose house they had passed the preceding night. He said she was not his wife, as had at first been supposed. He first met her in the Packet in which they came over from Bristol.

DORK, MARCH 17.

On Thursday his Majesty's ship *Semiramis*, Captain Richardson, arrived at Cove from Plymouth, and the Prince William armed brig, Captain A. Mott, from the Downs, to reinforce the squadron of ships employed on the Irish station. The *Triccolo* sloop, Captain Renny, is shortly expected to join the ships on this station.

His Majesty's gun brig *Linnet*, arrived on Friday, with several transports under convoy, to take troops, stores, &c. for Lishoh; and to receive detachments of the German dragoons for Harwich.

The *Locust* sloop, Captain Alexander Renny, is shortly expected to reinforce the squadron of ships on this station.

The *Providence*, Captain P. Rye, has the convoy signal flying for the Downs, and will proceed the moment the German cavalry are embarked on board the *Kingston* and *Leda* transports, for Harwich. They will commence their embarkation to-morrow or next day.

The *Semiramis*, Captain C. Richardson, is issuing convoy instructions to the trade bound to the West Indies.

Arrived on Friday his Majesty's sloop *Crane*, Capt W. Heyden, from Portsmouth, with two transports under convoy.

His Majesty's sloop *Crane* and *Linnet* gun brig, sailed yesterday for Portsmouth.

The *Earl Spencer* cutter, arrived at Cove from Plymouth on Sunday last.
