A London paper says, "The house of Sir J. Ermer stopped payment on Saturday. This failure is likely to involve several houses in the sugar line."

Saturday night last, the Morning Star, of Preston, bound from Liverpool to Dondalk, with an assorted cargo of merchants' goods, was stranded at Skerries; the vessel shortly after went to pieces by the violence of the surf, and the cargo totally lost. The passengers perished. The Rev. Mr. Johnstone, a magistrate in that neighbourhood, merits the greatest praise, for his active and humane exertions to preserve the remnant of the wreck, and and save the lives of the crew who were in the shrouds for several hours. On Saturday evening last, the sloop Margaret, of Greenock, Thos. Shephard master, was totally wrecked in Rossbay, near Loophead. The master and crew were providentially saved, after having endured the severest hardships, and been on the shortest possible allowance for 15 days, antecedent to that day.

Yesterday morning, P. Meehan and J. Molony were taken from the county jail, under a strong escort of cavalry and infantry, to O'Brien's Bridge, where they were flogged pursuant to their sentence at our last Assizes.

We are extremely concerned to state, that disturbance of a very serious nature took place in Gosport, on the 17th inst. in consequence of the insolent conduct of some of the inhabitants towards the Dublin and North Cork militia regiments stationed in that town. It being Saint Patrick's Day, the non-commissioned officers and privates of the Dublin and Cork militias, stationed at Gosport, were indulged in their accustomed annual merrymaking; disputes rose in consequence of some of the lower order of the town ridiculing the national badge by wearing carrots, radishes, &c. in their hats. The paddies would not allow such indignities to be offered to the ballowed shanrock, with impunity, and though we would be as unwilling as any other members of the community to encourage disorder or riot, nevertheless we do on this occasion most sincerely commend the national spirit of our countrymen, who took the most immediate and efficacious mode of getting rid of the insults intended, by soundly thrashing the backs of those civilized gentlemen whose waggery was put for- ward on the occasion. Most anxiously do we trust that such insults shall not be repeated; but full as anxiously do we trust that if they should, they may meet a simi- lar retribution of chastisement. The account received at this office states, that "for several hours the town exhibited the appearance of a siege—shops close shut up—pickets guarding every avenue—and the inhabi- tants running to secure themselves within their dwell- ings, and the watermen on the beach took shelter in their boats, and pushed off from the shore; while those who were arriving with passengers, put back without landing them."
