sufficient quantity at that enormous price.

His Lordship then proved that the people, on the fore of the crop of potatoes, could not avail themves the stock of oats which still remain in the country t which would soon be consumed by the distillence; in the very parts of the country which were most tressed, the distilleries drew at least thirty thousand rrels of oats per week, from that stock.

Mr. Cassidy of Monastereven, the principal distiller the county, agreed with his Lordship. He was most rious, for the sake of the people, that distillation means should be stopped, though he would lose a

siderable sum by that prohibition.

The grand jury resolved to present an address to the rd Lieutenaut, praying his Grace to prevent by Promation, all further distillation, as the only means averting all the horrible consequences of a famine.
