

Thurs Jay night, last, in Clonmel as Lieu-Colonel adden, of the Monaghan regiment, was returning to Barrack, he was assaulted near the gate, by two lads who appeared to be in liquor. Being an active able man, he beat them both heartily, and was endeavouring to bring them to the guard house, when one of the 19th dragoons, hearing the scuffle, came to, and assisted him in taking them into custody. The colonel had no arms, being in coloured cloths—the prisoners' names are John Phelan and Thomas Egan, and reside in the neighbourhood; they were the following day committed to gaol by the Mayor, of Clonmel.

At the assizes of the county of Kildare, Lord Clonry addressed the grand jury, on the subject of the present scarcity of provisions. His Lordship entered by a detail of the prices of potatoes (the staple articles of Irish food), in all the midland counties—showing, in incontrovertible documents, that the prices had risen from two to three or four pence per stone; and that even in some districts they could not be procured in sufficient quantity at that enormous price. His Lordship then proved that the people, on the failure of the crop of potatoes, could not avail themselves of the stock of oats which still remain in the country, which would soon be consumed by the distilleries; in the very parts of the country which were most distressed, the distilleries drew at least thirty thousand reels of oats per week, from that stock. Mr. Cassidy, of Monastereven, the principal distiller of the county, agreed with his Lordship. He was most anxious, for the sake of the people, that distillation in corn should be stopped, though he would lose a considerable sum by that prohibition. The grand jury resolved to present an address to the Lord Lieutenant, praying his Grace to prevent by Proclamation, all further distillation, as the only means averting all the horrible consequences of a famine.
