By the following letter it appears that there is a  
French squadron in the West Indies:

"PORT GLASGOW, MAY 4—Yesterday arrived the  
Pilgrim, Patterson, from Guadaloupe—sailed the 23d  
ult. Captain Patterson reports, that when he left the  
West Indies, Admiral Laforey had sailed in the Dragon  
man of war, with all the squadron, in pursuit of two  
French frigates and a brig, said to have troops on board,  
who had burnt several Americans, the crews of some  
of them having landed at St. Bartholomew's. No ad-  
vice of any British vessels having been captured by  
them."

The two following letters from Dover must be read  
with considerable interest:

"DOVER, MAY 4—I am sorry to acquaint you of  
the loss of his Majesty's sloop Skylark and Apelles on  
the French coast, about four miles to the Northward  
and Eastward of Etaples, on Saturday last, in thick  
weather. One of the Lieutenants of the former landed  
here this afternoon, and from him we hear, that the  
whole of the crew of the Skylark was saved by her boat,  
and that the brig was blown up to prevent her falling  
into the hands of the enemy. The Apelles, it is feared,  
was taken possession of by the French; and as to her  
crew nothing at present is known.

"DOVER, MAY 5.—His Majesty's sloop of war  
Apelles went past this morning, dismasted, for the  
Downs. We must attribute the recovery of her in the  
first instance to the exertions of the enemy: the com-  
mandant at Boulogne directed 200 soldiers and sailors  
to proceed to the vessel and endeavour to get her off,  
in which they succeeded; but our brave tars not willing  
they should bear away the prize, three boats volunteer-  
ed from his Majesty's sloops Castilian, Redpole, and  
Phipps schooner, and made a dash amongst the French-  
men, who were so much surprised that they made a  
precipitate retreat, leaving only four on board, who  
were taken prisoners, and the Apelles was brought off  
in triumph! On board were a vast number of mus-  
kets, &c. which the French soldiers brought with them.  
Captain Hoffman, the Purser, surgeon and 19 men were  
taken prisoners; the remainder of the crew and also the  
crew of the Skylark are arrived safe."
