We have this day the painful duty of announcing the death of Philip Roche, Esq. He departed this life on Tuesday morning last, in Dublin; his remains are to be interred in the family vault at Drumabanna, near this city.

The functions of the catholic board will cease on the return of Lord Pingal from his mission; and it is thought that aggregate meetings will take place early in June, for the purpose of preparing fresh petitions.

The Yeomanry in the Counties of Mayo, Clare, Kerry, and Limerick, have been placed on permanent duty to relieve the army stationed in different parts of these counties.

In consequence of the refusal to bid for a Loan of two millions the 7th inst. it was notified that a bidding for a loan of one million and a half would be received at the Castle on Monday; and several gentlemen having attended there for the purpose, it was urged to Sir C. Saxton, that sufficient notice had not been given, particularly as it was expected proposals would be received from London. Whereupon the business was deferred until Tuesday, when Messrs. Gibbons and Williams attended, and gave in a proposal to take the loan upon the terms of receiving a bonus of a treasury bill of £10 17s. 6d. per cent, but Sir Charles Saxton having alleged that the offer fell short of the sum mentioned in the sealed papers, and that therefore it could not be received, Messrs. Gibbons and Williams made a second proposal of taking £10 per cent. but this being also declared inadmissible, they declined making any further offer.

On Thursday morning last, the Alectum, Wighton, belonging to Dundee, with a cargo of coals for Ireland, struck on a bank, while going out of the river. Being a very old vessel, she soon broke up, although the weather was by no means boisterous.—The whole crew, (six in number) were unfortunately drowned, the mate excepted, who had just stepped into the boat, when the painter broke, and he was unable to regain the ship.
