We have received since our last, London prints of the 1st, 2d, 3d, and 4th, inst. Those of the latter date which arrived last night present us with intelligence of the deepest interest, for which we refer to our preceding columns. Respecting the Administration, our Parliamentary reports afford the only authentic intelligence, and therefore to detail the idle nonsense of those prints which deal in mere gossip, and indulge in displays of their adroitness in the art of cabinet-making would be to abuse our readers.

With the most lively and gratifying sensations, in which we are fully convinced our readers will sympathise, we extract the following account of the reception of Lord Glentworth in Killarney, from the *Southern Reporter*:

LORD GLENTWORTH.

"This illustrious young nobleman with whose exertions in the cause of religious freedom in the independent city of Limerick, and wherever else he appeared, our readers are acquainted, has been received in Killarney with feelings commensurate to and called for, by his exertions. He arrived at Coffey's Inn in that town, on Tuesday evening last at a late hour, where every possible attention was paid to him, and on his return from the Lakes the next day, the inhabitants, who were in the mean time apprised who he was, received him with cheers, and at night a large bon fire was made opposite the Inn. Refreshment and money were offered to the people, but refused, accompanied with the honest observation, that they wanted no reward for evincing their sense of gratitude for his exertions in behalf of his country. They continued to surround the Inn till 4 o'clock in the morning, when they marched off with music playing his local national tune, Garry Owen.—Such are the sincere effusions of the Irish people in acknowledgment for services conferred upon them; and we can only say, that the heart that is insensible to their gratitude will never succeed in exciting it."

The Charity Sermon, intended to be preached on Sunday last in St. George's Church, by the Rev. Wm. D. Hoare, for the benefit of the House of Industry, is unavoidably postponed until Sunday, 21st June, inst.

The Kilkenny militia are now proceeding on their route from Bandon for Dublin, where they are to be quartered.

Tuesday, the body of a man, wearing the uniform of the 52d regiment, was thrown on the beach at Furbog, near Galway; it appeared to be a long time in the water, as it was very much disfigured.

On Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday, three divisions of the 76th regiment of foot, marched from Kilkenny for Kinsale; where they are to be quartered.—The Northumberland regt. of militia, now in Fermoy, are to replace the 76th.

DREADFUL ACCIDENT.—On Monday se'night one of the most terrible accidents on record in the history of the colliers, took place at Felling, near Gateshead, Northumberland, in the mine belonging to Mr. Bradling, which was the admiration of the district, for the excellence of its air and arrangements. Nearly the whole of the workmen were below, the second set having gone down before the last had come up, when a double blast of hydrogen gas took place, and set the mine on fire, forcing up such a volume of smoke as darkened the air to a considerable distance, and scattered an immense quantity of small coal from the upcast shaft. In this calamity, 28 men and boys perished, 28 of whom are still in the mine; which continues un-
