NORTHERN WAR .- Accounts from Paris, to the | 5th inst. have been received—they inform us that Bo naparte has declared war against Russia and Sweden. By Swedish and German papers, brought by the last Anholt mail, we learn, that Bonsparte and the King of Prussia have entered into a treaty of allowance, offensive and defensive, by which they mutually agree to support each other per far aut nefas. They also anwhich is, that a treaty of peace between Russia and Turkey, was signed at Jassy, sealed on the river Proth, on the 10th, ult. on the follow conditions:—1st. the river Pruth, which intersects Moldavia and empties itself into the Danube, to be the temporary boundary of the two Powers until the treaty be concluded and ratified. 2dly. An alliance offensive and defensive to be entered into, supported by an army of 50,000 Turks, if the Austrians should join in the expected war between Russia and France.-Of this intelligence, some of the London papers state, that government have re-ceived advices, while others assert, that it depends up-on no other authority than the verasity of a gentleman who travelled from Wilna to Gottenburgh, and who has connections at the court of Petersburgh, -- No action had taken place between the French and Russians, to so late a date as the 15th of June.
