NORTHERN WAR.—Accounts from Paris, to the 5th inst. have been received—they inform us that Bonaparte has declared war against Russia and Sweden. By Swedish and German papers, brought by the last Anholt mail, we learn, that Bonaparte and the King of Prussia have entered into a treaty of allowance, offensive and defensive, by which they mutually agree to support each other *per fax aut nefas*. They also announce an event of a much more important nature, which is, that a treaty of peace between Russia and Turkey, was signed at Jassy, sealed on the river Pruth, on the 10th. ult. on the follow conditions:—1st. the river Pruth, which intersects Moldavia and empties itself into the Danube, to be the temporary boundary of the two Powers until the treaty be concluded and ratified. 2dly. An alliance offensive and defensive to be entered into, supported by an army of 50,000 Turks, if the Austrians should join in the expected war between Russia and France.—Of this intelligence, some of the London papers state, that government have received advices, while others assert, that it depends upon no other authority than the veracity of a gentleman who travelled from Wilna to Gottenburgh, and who has connections at the court of Petersburg.—No action had taken place between the French and Russians, to so late a date as the 15th of June.

Sunday last, the Right Hon. the Lord Chief Baron, and the Hon. Baron George, Judges of Assize for the Munster Circuit, arrived in this city, and yesterday morning proceeded to Ennis, to open their commission for the county of Clare.

We perceive by the last Racing Calendar, that the Races of Newcastle, near this city, will commence on the 20th of August.

The Lord Chancellor has been pleased to appoint John Wickham, of Mudeboy, Esq. a Magistrate for the county of Limerick.

The Catholics of the county of Clare meet on Saturday next; and the Catholics of the county of Roscommon are to meet on the 25th instant.

Parliament, we understand, will be prorogued by Commission, on Monday, the 20th instant.

During the last fortnight of the month of June, his MAJESTY suffered a high degree of agitation; but he was rather better on Saturday, when the Queen's council held their quarterly meeting, to make their report. Shortly after, however, the paroxysm increased, and on Monday he became speechless. When this alarming symptom came on, expresses were sent for Sir Henry Hallford and Dr. Heberden, who immediately went to Windsor. The interruption to speech, however, lasted only a few minutes, and the habitual course of rapid and inarticulate speaking returned till nine in the evening, when his Majesty fell asleep, and had about five hours of quiet rest. By the last accounts we are informed that his Majesty is considerably better.

## TO THE Noblemen, Gentlemen, & Landholders, Of the County of LIMERICK.

THE Grant of a Presentment for the execution of the Mail Coach Road from Limerick to Tralee, is of such magnitude, that it requires the attention of all persons interested in the peace or prosperity of the County; and when it is stated that the Country Charges, which amounted in the Year 1803 to £11,636. 2s. 11d. appear by the Parliamentary Report upon the subject, to have augmented in 1806 to £21,574. 4s. 2d. and have since been so much added to, that the Charge now under collection for the last Half Year's Levy, upon the Barony of Lower Connelloe, amounts to £5876. 10s. 10d.; and upon all the Baronies of this County, to the aggregate sum of £37,012. 13s. 3d. for one Half Year's Levy, it will, I trust, justify this Address.

I have the satisfaction, however, to state, that the Charge imposed upon any Barony, for the Mail Coach Road from Creavesford to Glyn, is less than one penny farthing per Acre at each Assizes; and, therefore, constitutes a very small part of this enormous burthen. But as I have not been summoned to attend upon the Spring or Summer Grand Juries, and am therefore prevented from personally laying before the Gentlemen so assembled, the account of about *Eleven Hundred Pounds*, which has been laid out on this great undertaking, between the last and present Assizes, I beg leave to mention, that there is now an easy passage, even in its unfinished state, cut through the Rocks of Foynes and Lelieja, and a retaining Wall against the Tide, built under my House, of which the particulars of the Expenses are entered into Account Books, and subdivided under different heads, and that I shall feel thankful to such Gentlemen as concur with my wish, of inspecting both on the spot where the Work has been executed, and the expenditure of the Public Money can best be understood.
