Action between the French and Russians.

Letters were received to day from the French coast, to the 9th instant; they state, that a report had reached there, that a general action had taken place between the French and Russians, that the latter had been defeated with the loss of 25 or 30,000 men. We can vouch for such a letter having been received from the French coast, and that it was corroborated by another from Paris of the 6th, but we cannot venture to speak to the accuracy of their contents. The accounts from Bordeaux, by way of Paris, state, that the crops of the present season promised a short time ago an abundant harvest, but that lately unfavourable weather had intervened, and the prospect was greatly lessened.

. An Algerine squadron, consisting of two frigates, two sloops, and two brigs, has for some time been cruizing in the Mediterranean. On the 17th April, the Haughty gun brig, Lieut. Harvey, proceeding with a convoy for Malta, fell in with it, when the Algerine commodore, after examining the ships, ordered the detention of a Greek vessel laden with corn. On this order being notified to Lieut. Harrey, he immediately went on board the Algerine, accompanied by his surgeon, as interpreter, to remonstrate against this unfriendly act, and to require the liberation of the vestel, Instead, however, of his request being complied with, he received the most gross and abusive language: his own ship was threatened to be seized; and on refusing to deliver up some papers belonging to the Greek vessel, he was knocked down, repeatedly kicked, and his pockets rifled. He was instantly obliged to depart, without obtaining the release of the vessel, and proceeded to Cagliari. A representation of the affair has been made to Sir Edward Pellew.

LISBON, JUNE 21. General Graham commands the 1st, 6th, and 7th divisions on the right; General Picton the Sd, and a considerable Portuguese force, the centre; General Leitn the 4th, 5th, and light divisions, forming the left. The cavalry consists of six regiments, brought up by Sir Stapleton Cetton, the two heavy Germans under Gen. Bock, and the 1st Hussars, and 11th dragoons -ih all ten regimenta.

The enemy are recollecting in Seville and Cordova, and, no doubt, will advance on General Hill, posted at Albuera with 19,000 men. It is not considered as improbable, that another battle may be fought on that ground, already immortalized by British valor, equally sanguinary as the for mer one.
