Catalonia, the affairs of the French seem to be in a desperate state: indeed they every where suffer almost distress for want of provisions.—We regret, however, that the unfortunate inhabitants are not more severely, visited by the calamities of the mine.

The following are a few of the most interesting extracts from the Cadiz papers:

Madrid, May 13.

On the 11th instant, a detachment of the royal troops marched towards Tarazona, and the report was, they were to protect the city of Valencia, to which the intrusive King was to proceed, but it precisely returned from Vallicas without eating the provisions prepared for them. The cause of this preparation was the advice it received, that El Empeño had entered Cuenca.

Misery continues producing the most shocking effects in this capital, and sickness even extends to the unmoderated classes. In the parish of St. Martin's there are seven Chapels appropriated to the administration of the sacrament. We are assured that, in the four months of the year, 18,000 people have died in town. Our misery is inconceivable, and proportionably great is the mortality in the houses, hospitals, and even streets."

Cadiz, June 16.

They write from Granada, under date of the 29th, that scarcity and misery has there reached its greatest height; and the barbarous French cut and carry off the harvest, which is fast approaching to maturity, and of the finest promise.

One of our small vessels of war the Sappho, Capt. Brady was some time ago compelled to fire upon an American gun-boat that had the audacity to attempt to carry off a Spanish vessel, that had been under convoy of the British flag.

The arrival of General Morea, in Sweden is contradicted.

General Philippon, it is now ascertained, has made good his escape to France; but we learn, from good authority, that the auxiliaries to his escape have been detected, and we regret the non-application of the bill now lying in Parliament.

LONDON, JULY 15.—The King is not so well to-day as had been for these few days past.

Since our last, we have received London Journals of the 21st, 23rd, 24th, 25th, and 26th inst. The accounts of the scene of hostilities in the North are very important; the French papers received are to the 11th: they contain three bulletins of the French army in the North, which may be found in the preceding numbers—they also contain the diplomatic correspondence between Russia and France, prior to the commencement of hostilities, they are, however, of very little interest. The pacific propositions, made in April by Bonaparte to the British Government, with the answer of Lord Castlereagh, are superadded to the above numbers; for which see preceding page.

On the 23d of June, according to the Anhalt papers, Napoleon declared war against Russia; and on the 23th the French army crossed the Russian frontiers.
