the English frigate Belvidera, commanded by Richard Byron, was, on the 24th of July, taken by the frigate *Sandy Hood*, when she fell in with the *Belvidera*, consisting of the President, Congress and Essex frigates, and a sloop; which ships, as soon as they were sighted, without the least hesitation, opened fire upon her. The *Belvidera*, of 32 guns, a very superior hostile force, pursued her, maintaining a running fire as she was within reach of shot; which she had two men killed, and much hurt in the thigh, by a gun. The *Belvidera* made the best of her way, and acquainted Admiral Sawyer of the *Belvidera* with her damages.

It is by the London papers, that God has disposed to treat this aggression as arising from an American declaration, that Admiral Sawyer had ordered three American vessels, which were used in retaliation. This moderating, and if it is still to be preserved, is productive of the most beneficial result. The above accounts unquestionably inspire us with a sense of the expense we have so long endured.—We rest upon a solitary and very true maxim, that if our Government act with moderation, till they find in what manner orders in Council will be received—by adhering to this change of system, and subsequent adherence to it, will then be in cordial embrace. If the present system had long since been adopted, it would now be placed in the disagreeable position of waging war, or becoming a suitor, which is obviously rejected upon more advantageous terms than we can now expect. We do not regret the course which we have abandoned (we hope not too late), but we are for ever in oblivion. One truth is, that we hope our Government will, in remembrance—the farther we go from our original path, the more impervious our

### LIMERICK CATHOLIC MEETING.

AT a Meeting of Roman Catholics of the Co. and City of Limerick, held at St. Michael's Chapel, Limerick, on Friday the 24th of July, 1812, the following Resolutions were unanimously adopted,

Tha. R. Ryan, of Scarteen, Esq. in the Chair,

RESOLVED—That the Petition to the Legislature, for a total repeal of all Statutes, which restrain and limit the exercise of Religious Worship, as agreed to by the last Aggregate Meeting, held in Dublin, on the 2d July inst. meets our fullest approbation, and that we hereby adopt it.

RESOLVED—That we hereby repeat the expression of our unshaken confidence, in those leading and distinguished Noblemen and Gentlemen, composing THE GENERAL BOARD OF THE CATHOLICS OF IRELAND, who, amidst the storms and dangers of an angry and mistaken policy, have, with dauntless spirit, promoted the progress of our Cause, and have discharged their great trust with honor, zeal, and ability.

RESOLVED—That however injurious the policy which abounded to sever the PRINCE from the PEOPLE, the recent declarations in Parliament revive our long-cherished hopes, that THAT ILLUSTRIOUS PERSONAGE will adhere to those principles, which, by establishing the harmony and happiness of the subject, would best ensure the stability of the Throne, and the prosperity of the Empire.

RESOLVED—That at a time when Continental Europe is yielding her last sigh, and all the rivulets of rational liberty are nearly lost in the flood of universal Domination—and when these Countries, the last refuge of European Freedom, are threatened with no less than total annihilation—we consider the continuance of political disabilities, as leading to paralyze the energies of the State, and to further the views of our implacable Enemy; it would, therefore, be a criminal apathy in us, at this perilous crisis, to cease our earnest application to the Legislature, to embrace within the protection of equal Laws, ALL & EVERY description of his Majesty's Subjects.

RESOLVED—That having with regret observed a design to mar the progress of our just claims, by propositions intended solely, to raise alarms against us; we are called upon to declare to the Empire and to the World 'That we will enter into no compromise for our rights, incompatible with the integrity of our Religion—that the best security we can give is, our ardent attachment to the Constitution which we are solemnly and irrevocably sworn to defend—our proved and invariable fidelity to the Laws, guaranteed by our Properties, our Lives, and the very principles of the Religion we profess.

RESOLVED—That for the approaching Parliamentary discussion of our Claims, are we indebted to the liberal and enlightened Protestants of the Empire, in whose zeal and sympathy, we have the best security against any invidious attempts to estrange them from our Interests;
