most sanguinary, in which they four times attempted to board, being full of troops, they made all sail, and took refuge under the batteries of the town. We have been desperately cut up, and, I am sorry to add, lost several brave fellows. It is now ten o'clock—the bell done tolling, after burying the dead, and I have just left the deck, after performing the last and melancholy rites due to christians. This task was the more painful, as, in reading the funeral service over the dead, it also fell to my lot to perform that office for the clerk, who was killed in the act of speaking to me; a person whom I was exceedingly partial to, and one of the finest young men I ever knew. The Captain did me the honour to place the marines and boarders under my direction; my hat was knocked off by a double-headed shot; I was twice knocked down; but, thank God, have all my legs and arms hanging about me; nor did I suffer any injury, contusion of little consequence in my side. These are circumstances I would not acquaint you with, but, as my messmates are writing to their friends, I do not see why I should not do the same, particularly as you will see the business in the papers."

Last Thursday James Graves, Esq. Surveyor of Excise, lodged in his Majesty's stores in Ennis, two stills, together with the heads and worms, which he seized in a remote part of the county Galway, where he destroyed two extensive private distilleries. Mr. Graves was assisted by a party of the sixth dragoons from Gort as well in the performance of the above duty, as in conveying the stills, &c. to the stores in Ennis.

Last Monday at night as John Downis, Esq. Sur. of Excise, was discharging some revenue duty in the neighbourhood of Gort, in which he was assisted by a detachment of the sixth dragoons, a number of the surrounding peasantry assembled, and having manifested some indications of a hostile nature, which induced Mr. Downis, for the purpose of intimidation, ordered the military to load, in performing which duty, and in the moment of raming the cartridge, the serjeants' pistol went off, and shattered his right hand in so miserable a way as to leave no hopes of his being fit for further military service. The circumstance is much regretted, the sufferer being a very fine young fellow, highly esteemed by his officers, and beloved by his brother soldiers.
