That it appears to us that the unqualified repeal of those laws would not be consistent with the perfect safety to the constitution which we feel we have a right to require-but would eventually substitute in their place a Roman catholic ascendancy, which would proceed to a domination, necessarily, subversive of the protestant settlement of this country, on the preservation and strength of which we firmly believe the connexton between the two countries, and ultimately the

security of the Empire to depend.

That it appears also to us, that in any further repeal or modification of those laws, the most perfect and guarded security which legislative wisdom can devise, should be provided for the maintenance and preservation of that constitution in church and state; and for its defence against all future attacks and encroachments. What should be the extent of that repeal, or what the modifications or arrangements which should attend it, we presume not to point out-but of those concomitant arrangements we would decidedly say: that they should be such as to exclude all foreign interferences in the nomination of their clergy, which influence the discipline of the Roman catholic church gives a powerful, and also secret, extent to.
