

ought not to adjourn until they are impeded. On the other hand, it was said, it cannot make a material difference whether they are laid now or four months hence, when they most certainly will be laid. That although, by imposing them now, they might collect from them a half a million or a million of dollars before Congress again meet, yet the money will, in the mean time, be in the pockets of the people. They professed to have no fears that the people would not bear these taxes.

This recapitulation may serve to shew the spirit in which the war has commenced. It demonstrates that there is a strong feeling against the war, and most corroborate the expectations of those who think that the repeal of the Orders in Council will be satisfactory to America. Should such prove the fact, the language of Mr. Griswold, appointing the 23d last, for a day of general fasting, humiliation, and prayer, in which he hopes that it will please God to sheath the sword at the moment it is drawn, will have been happily realized.

Congress was expected to adjourn on the 6th inst., until the first Monday in November. A bill to that effect had passed the House of Representatives.

Halifax, July 20.

Last evening arrived his Majesty's schooner *Paz-Lieut. Domarsq*, from Cape Breton. On Wednesday last, off Country Harbour, she discovered an American sloop privateer, and chased her to the eastward for several hours, but could not overtake her; afterwards off Country Harbour, she fell in with the schooner *Martha Darby*, which sailed from hence last week, with arms and ammunition for Country Harbour, and blankets for the Island of Sable; and a Liverpool schooner laden with fish, returning from the *Lambadore*; they were in possession of 15 of the crew of the privateer above alluded to. The *Martha* arrived last night; the Liverpool schooner will probably make her appearance this day.

A letter from St. John, N. C. of the 16th inst. mentions the arrival of his Majesty's ship *Indian*, from hence, at that place, and says, "the brig *Anne*, from Halifax for this port, is certainly taken and carried into Boston."

The *Plumper* arrived at St. John on the 15th inst.—She had taken 11 American vessels, but released them all except two—a brig and a ship; about 11,000 dollars were taken out of the American vessels.

Several vessels were driven on shore at Martinique early last month, during a gale of wind.

It is generally reported that the Marquis Wellington is to be made a Field Marshal.

The Court of Directors have taken off the restrictions imposed on the Madras suspended Officers, who were reinstated in their rank eighteen months ago;—and they are now permitted to return to their duty in India.

One of the Treasury Journals, in its description of the results of the victory of Salamanca, carries its adulation so far as to assert, that the clouds over Greenwich Hospital, on Tuesday week, formed an exact likeness of the Marquis of Wellington.
