extracted from a London paper:—

Government have lately received advice that a definitive treaty of alliance has been concluded between this country and the King of Persia, by Sir Gore Ouseley, on terms highly favorable to British interest, and calculated to unite the two countries in a lasting and advantageous connection. It has always been a primary object to include the Heir Apparent, Mirza Abbas, in the stipulations of any treaty between Persia and Great Britain. This object was uniformly recommended both by Sir H. Jones and by General Malcolm, and by every person who possessed any correct knowledge of the condition of Persia. The French made an attempt to bring about the conclusion of a similar treaty with France, but failed, notwithstanding all their diplomatic dexterity. This must add to the satisfaction which is felt at the success of Sir Gore Ouseley, which is principally ascribed to his personal influence with the King of Persia, which influence is supposed to be derived from his intimate knowledge of the language and customs of the country, and from the marked propriety of his conduct, since the arrival of the embassy in Persia—the treaty will be attended with the most beneficial results."

What splendid honor is here reflected on our gallant countryman, but it is not for this service alone our country is indebted to him—his life, since manhood's earliest dawn, has been devoted to her interest, and has shone eminently meritorious throughout a chequered train of perilous enterprises. India was principally his sphere of action, and there he has obtained the warmest esteem and confidence of Marquis Wellesley, and all who by their situation could best appreciate his transcendent merit. In whatever light we consider him, as a soldier, a statesman, or in private life, his heroism, talent, and worth, rise in such glittering perspective, that the contemplation entrances, and we sink from the fragile presumption which would attempt delineation.

Sir William Ouseley, the highly esteemed brother of Sir Gore, is, we understand, daily expected in England.

On Sunday morning last, an alarming fire broke out in the concerns of Mr. Kiely, a cooper, in Old Clare-street, which raged with great fury, and threatened destruction to the concerns of James O'Sullivan, Esq. Through the great exertions of our active citizen, Mr. John Carroll, Agent to the Atlas Assurance Company, who attended with their fire-engine, the flames were prevented from spreading—a guard from the Commissariat attended. We regret to state the concerns and property were not insured.

A paragraph which we copied in our last from a cotemporary Journal, respecting the distressing occurrence at Drumcondra, imputed to Mrs. Campbell the death of her unfortunate husband, in a paroxysm of insanity. The paragraph, we are required to state, is erroneous. It has been corrected by the print from which we had extracted it, in the following manner—which precludes the necessity of any explanation on our part:—

"Yesterday we had the painful duty of mentioning what we conceived to be the particulars of a melancholy occurrence which took place at Drumcondra, near this city, on Friday last. We find our information had been inaccurate, inasmuch as it attributed the death of Mr. Campbell to the hand of his wife, raised against her husband, with whom she lived in perfect harmony, in a fatal paroxysm of insanity. Mr. Campbell, we understand, unfortunately died by his own hand; and while we mention the circumstance to appease the feelings of his much to be pitied widow, which we had inadvertently and unintentionally wounded, we must take occasion to express our sincere regret, that we have so small a portion of consolation to offer her, or her friends."

Wednesday morning a man was found dead, weltering in his blood, and his head shockingly fractured, in the area of a house in Cumberland street, Dublin—On examination he proved to be a watchman; and from different circumstances, it is supposed, that he sat for rest sake upon the parapet, fell asleep, and tumbled while in this condition.
