a hole at the side of the door,—heard the discharge,  
and saw Mr. Segerson instantly fall—has no doubt but  
the gun was fired by John Pennington. After the dis-  
charged deponent and the rest of the party fled. Before  
the shot was fired, and previous to the deceased coming  
up, heard Daniel Pennington say, "let me see the sol-  
dier that will be as good as John now." Cannot say  
whether Daniel was in his brother's house at the time  
the shot was fired. Among the seven of which the  
party consisted, there were but two pistols and a sword;  
nor was the deceased at all armed—no attempt what-  
ever had been made to force either of the houses.

Cornelius Hayes, police constable, sworn—was called  
upon, on Wednesday last, by John Segerson, a Ma-  
gistrate, to assist him in preserving the peace, and ar-  
resting Daniel Pennington on a Sheriff's warrant, to  
deponent and others directed—did attend accordingly,  
found the house of Daniel, which is immediately ad-  
joining that of John, closed against them—heard Daniel  
Pennington frequently abuse and threaten deceased on  
said day from a window; deceased having heard that  
provisions were conveyed, through a window, by a  
woman, to Daniel, deceased followed and struck her,  
was dot with the party during the entire of the time  
from Wednesday to Thursday; returned on Thursday,  
found deceased applying remedies to his head, which  
he heard was scalded by John Pennington—saw Edm.  
Murphy, (one of the Jurors) writing informations, at  
the dictation of the deceased, against John—deponent  
told deceased that arms were conveying into the  
houses, and that their brother, Michael, endeavoured  
to get in; deponent and deceased repaired to the house,  
and while Mr. Segerson was standing within a few  
yards in front of the house, a shot was fired through  
a hole close to the door, and the deceased instantly  
fell; as Mr. S. fell, deponent and his party ran off,  
seeing the friends of the Penningtons collecting; heard  
Michael call on his brothers to come out; when de-  
ceased came to the house, heard Daniel say to deceased  
"damnation seize him (meaning his brother John) for  
not killing you at once."—deponent heard Daniel, on  
Wednesday, give directions to a female relation of his  
to have her friends come to his house to protect him  
against deceased—cannot say whether they did come,  
or whether they were in either of the houses when the  
shot was fired.

John Sweeney, a police constable, sworn—His evi-  
dence went only to prove that he saw Daniel make his  
escape from the house, and was of opinion that he had  
a gun in his hand at the time.

Here the evidence closed, which was read over, and  
commented upon by the Coroner, after which the Jury  
returned the following verdict:

Verdict—We find and present, that the deceased  
John Segerson, Esq. late of Fortwilliam, in the county  
of Kerry, was on Thursday, 17th Sept. inst. feloniously  
and wilfully murdered by Daniel Pennington and John  
Pennington, both of Farrantoreen, in the parish, bar-  
ony, and county aforesaid, farmers, with a gun laden  
with powder and slugs, value about 5s. at Farrantoreen,  
aforesaid; and we find, that the said Pennington  
fled after the commission of said murder.
