GENERAL ELECTION.

The expected dissolution of Parliament, in the early part of the ensuing month, has sent the present representatives among their constituents; and an active, though a private canvass is on foot in the different counties and cities in Ireland, and in other places which enjoy the privilege of returning a member to parliament. It is understood that warm contests will render the period of election more important than has usually been the case; and it is said, that a number of new candidates are ready to declare themselves, supported by pretensions not a little alarming to some of the old political interests. It will be a season of great public interest, but we sincerely trust not characterised by the discreditable subtleties and resources of party, which often prolong elections so unfavorably for the public repose and tranquillity. Something on the old fashion of maintaining contests, however, is anticipated.

Limerick is not solitary in endeavouring to regain its independence and legitimate representation in Parliament—Galway, Newry, Mallow, and Kinsale, have rallied under the flag our city has unfurled, and with one accord pursue this constitutional course.

The *Star* of Thursday last, informs us, that "Lord Castlereagh, by family compromise with the Downshires, is to be returned, unopposed, for the county of Derry." This is strange, for in public life Marquis D. and Lord C. are diametrically opposite in character.—This coalition, however, was reported some time since—was contradicted—and it appears is now revived.

For the county of Limerick, four candidates have declared themselves—Wm. T. Monsell, Esq. Tervoe, Standish O'Grady, Esq. (son of the Lord Chief Baron), and the present members, Colonel Odell and the Hon. Windham Quin.

For the city of Limerick, Lord Glentworth it is expected will start in opposition to Col. Vereker, the present member.

For the county of Clare, Lord James O'Bryen and Col. Burton are the avowed candidates, in opposition to the present members, Sir Edward O'Brien and Col. Fitz-Gerald.

For the county of Galway, five candidates have declared themselves—James Daly, Esq. Dunsandle—Col. Giles Eyre—John Darcy, Esq. Kiltalla—and the present members, Denis Bowes Daly and Col. Martin.

For the town of Galway, Thomas Barnwell Martin, (son of the colonel) has declared himself in opposition to the present member Mr. Ponsonby (son of the Right Hon. George Ponsonby and nephew to D. B. Daly, Esq.)

For the county Tipperary, Col. Bagwell has again declared himself opponent of the present members, the Hon. Gen. Matthew and the Hon. F. A. Prittie.

For the county of Kerry, Col. Crosbie is again to start in opposition to the present members, Henry A. Herbert and the Knight of Kerry.

We understand that Mr. White has declared himself a candidate for the county of Leitrim. As the present members, Messrs. Clements and Latouche, are determined to offer themselves, it is expected there will be a very warm contest.

We hear Colonel Barry has relinquished his intention of opposing Sir Frederick Flood, in the county Wexford; as, however, Col. Ram is expected to persevere, there is likely to be a strong opposition to the present members.

Lord Delvin is expected to declare himself a candidate for the county of Westmeath. The Hon. Colonel Pakenham and Mr. Rochfort will undoubtedly offer themselves again.

The Electors of the county of Wicklow have been requested to keep themselves disengaged, as a candidate, hostile to the political principles of the present members, is expected to declare himself.

Mr. Hutchinson is so highly esteemed by his constituents, that there is no doubt but he will be re-elected for the city of Cork. Mr. Longfield, we have no doubt, will be also returned without opposition.

Two gentlemen, besides the present members, are expected to become candidates for the co. of Dublin.

Lord Bective, son to the Marquis of Headfort, has addressed the county of Meath, and as the present members, Sir Marcus Sommerville, and T. Bligh, Esq. mean to offer themselves, a very contested election may be expected in that highly respectable county.

Lord Forbes has arrived from England, on his way to the county of Longford. His Lordship and Sir T. Featherstone, are expected to be re-elected for that county, without opposition.

The Right Hon. Henry Grattan and Mr. Shaw are so perfectly in possession of the confidence of the electors of Dublin, that any opposition to their re-election, is not to be looked for.
