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observation, at the close of the election the Poll Book of Lord Glentworth's Boyse, agent for Lord Glentworth, refused to return Lord G. on the ground that he had admitted non-residents illegally to vote, and persons to vote who were produced entitled to their freedom, and whom Lord G. would have given his Lordship a writ of Habeas Corpus. The Sheriffs replied certainly they would then give by Mr. Boyse, that a petition should be referred to the Parliament, to set aside the election—and also, against the Sheriffs on account of their acting as Sheriffs during the entire of said election. The direction and influence of Mr. Vereker made on the part of Lord G. to the electors, was uniformly overruled.—In particular called upon, on the part of several freemen and freeholders, to object, the objections or protest now made, also refused."

At the poll on Wednesday evening, I addressed the electors as follows:—I congratulate you upon the termination of the poll, so pompously ushered in by my opponent, but so impotently terminated. The Noble Lord stood as the champion of independence, and the mortification to find himself defeated every independent elector in the neighbourhood. To turn to myself—was I not brought more proudly to the hustings, and more honorably attended at the hustings, than any candidate more triumphantly taken, than all the exertions of the Noble Lord, for the last year he has been able to obtain twenty-seven legal votes; whereas,

A chair, truly elegant and superb, had been prepared for Lord Glentworth—it was designed by Quinlan—the drapery was prepared by Mrs. Kencilly, of Francis-street—the exterior was light blue silk, lined with brown—it was most tastefully decorated and festooned with spangled ribbon, surmounted by laurel. On the front of the canopy was inscribed, in golden letters—**GOD SAVE THE KING—underneath, GLENTWORTH AND INDEPENDENCE—on one side, THE CHAMPION OF OUR RIGHTS—on the other side, THE MAN OF THE PEOPLE—on the back, UNIVERSAL TOLERATION.**—His Lordship's hat was profusely ornamented with the emblems of the different trades of the city, previously presented to him by the guilds. The band of the 90th regt. attended. The procession was composed of the different guilds, with their respective banners—the committee of independence, with wands—the commercial body—citizens, in a word, of all ranks, amounting to nearly 50,000. The procession moved from the Commercial Buildings, down Charlotte's quay, over Baul's Bridge, thro' Mary's-street, Bridge-street, George's Quay, Broad-street, John's-street, Garryowen, round by William-street, thence to Patrick's-street, Francis-street, Arthur's-Quay, George's-street, and thence to his Lordship's house in Henry-street. On passing the Bank of Messrs. Roche, the houses of Messrs. Boyse and Barrington, (agents to the independents) the house of Mr. Tuthill, &c. &c. the acclamations were unbounded. At Arthur's-Quay, all the vessels of the harbour exhibited every mark of respect, by discharge of guns and display of flags and pendants, while the masts, yards, &c. were crowded with spectators. Baskets of fruit, ornamented with gold leaf, were at several intervals presented—and, with most interesting effect, in George's-street, Mrs. Michael Rochford waved a sprig of laurel, which she gracefully conveyed to his Lordship. At every step, the windows at either side, hailed his approach with the most animated greeting, while the report of guns filled the pauses in the acclamations of the attending crowds.

In representing to our readers the scenes of this day, as the pledged encouragers of public decorum, we joyfully record the deportment that guided the collected population of Limerick. The orderly multitudes that moved through our streets at the approach of our first procession, suppressed in solemn calmness their resentment of opposed claims—and to the present object of their public hopes, uttered their sentiment with an universal decency of applause, uninterrupted by a single instance of riotous acclamation. Such a sight, the citizens of Limerick may reflect on with exultation, and the Irishman quote to his neighbours of England.

In the evening, Colonel Vereker was invited by his friends to a congratulatory dinner, at Swinburn's hotel, where the festive party continued till near five the following morning, while merry peals from the bells of the cathedral, varied the enjoyments of the night.

Mr. Canning and Gen. Gascoigne, have been returned for Liverpool.

We understand, that Mr. Tierney has not obtained a seat for the new Parliament.

A convoy will sail from Cork, for Lisbon and Cadiz, the first fair wind after the 26th inst.
