John D'Arcy, Esq. of Kiltolla, declared on the hustings his intention of not supporting any party in the present contest, as he did not think that the motives which governed the conduct of any of the candidates were purely disinterested. Mr. D'Arcy, it is said, could muster one thousand freeholders of his own and within his influence.

**COUNTY TIPPERARY ELECTION.—Seventh Day.—**  
The gross poll on Friday evening stood thus:—

Bagwell 1554—Mathew 1492—Prittie 1187.

In our last, we alluded to a meeting which we were informed had taken place between Colonel Bagwell and the Hon. F. A. Prittie. The following particulars we extract from the *Clonmel Advertiser*:—

Upon the subject of a transaction which occurred on Wednesday morning, we believe the following to be pretty near the truth:—Lord Lismore, we understand, brought a message to Mr. Bagwell from Mr. Prittie, intimating that the latter gentleman had some complaints to make regarding the conduct of the Sheriff's Deputies. Mr. Bagwell said, that he could hear no complaint against the Sheriff's Deputies, and referred him to the Sheriff. Lord Lismore intimated to Mr. Bagwell, that in case there could be no satisfaction granted in this way, a meeting between Mr. Prittie and Mr. Bagwell would be the inevitable consequence.—Mr. Bagwell replied, that though he had no wish to quarrel with Mr. Prittie, yet if that gentleman had so determined, he had not the slightest disinclination to indulge him. Mr. Bagwell and Mr. Prittie in a few minutes withdrew from the court-house to the field in the rear of the horse-barrack, accompanied by their seconds, Mr. Andrew Ryan, as the friend of Mr. Bagwell, and Lord Lismore, as that of Mr. Prittie. Mr. Bagwell had already taken his ground and received his pistols, when the High Sheriff arrived and bound both gentlemen to keep the peace in this county. Mr. Bagwell and his friend immediately afterwards crossed the river in a boat, and went into the county Waterford, where they waited about half an hour; but as Mr. Palliser, a magistrate for that county, arrived in time to prevent the peace being broken, no meeting took place there. We believe that Mr. Prittie intended the second meeting should take place in the county Kilkenny, and had gone off in that direction; but in the mean time the friends of the candidates on either side came to a determination to set the affair at rest till after the election.

On Wednesday evening, some words having arisen on electioneering matters between Edmond Scully, Esq. of Mount Bruis, and Nicholas Sadleir, Esq. of Tipperary, a meeting took place on Thursday morning between these young gentlemen in the county Waterford; being there interrupted, and bound over, by H. H. Bradshaw, Esq. they proceeded to a field near Two-Mile-Bridge, where each discharged a pistol, but, happily, without effect. On the interference of the Seconds and some other gentlemen, the matter was adjusted. Mr. Val. O'Meagher attended Mr. Scully, and Captain Hammersly Mr. Sadleir.

**COUNTY OF CORK ELECTION.**

On Friday last, the election for the county of Cork commenced. The precept having been read, directing the Sheriff to proceed to the appointment of two Representatives, Sir Augustus Warren, after a few preparatory observations, proposed Lord Bernard; he was seconded by Richard Boyle Townsend, Esq.

Sampson Stawell, Esq. next rose, and detailed, with much ability and vigour, the claims of Mr. Ponsonby and his family on the Irish public. He reminded the electors of the great duty which they were called upon to perform, the importance of which he described as very much increased by the present alarming state of affairs in Europe, and concluded by proposing the Hon. Geo. Ponsonby, as a gentleman eminently qualified by his principles and proved attachment to the dearest interest of his country to represent this populous and respectable county in Parliament; he was seconded by Thomas Rochefort, of Garrett's-town, Esq. who expressed his complete coincidence with the sentiments delivered by Col. Stawell.

Richard Aldworth, Esq. next rose and proposed the Hon. Richard Hare, as a gentleman who rested his claims on their favour as a resident of the county, and an independent gentleman; he was seconded by Robt. Beresford Esq.

The Sheriff having declared them duly elected, both Representatives addressed their constituents. The Knight of Kerry spoke at considerable length, with his usual eloquence and patriotism, and warmly expressed his thanks to his friends, for the repeated proofs they had given him of their confidence—he was of course repeatedly cheered. Col. Crosbie also addressed the electors expressive of his thanks and his determination to support the catholics.

The two Representatives were then chaired through the town, amidst the congratulating cheers of a numerous assemblage.
