were unanimously agreed to. The following are three of the resolutions:—

Resolved—"That it now appears to this meeting that nothing can frustrate the efforts of the friends of the independence of the town of Galway, in their exertions to establish their rights in the struggle in which they are at present engaged.

"That although a majority of illiterate non-resident peasantry, unacquainted with the English language, the tenants of the Right Hon. D. B. Daly and James Daly, Esq. may appear against them in the first instance, yet as such majority will be procured only by means unconstitutional and illegal, no doubt is entertained of the final triumph of the cause of independence, when brought before the proper tribunal.

"That in the event of the Hon. Frederick Ponsonby being returned by the Sheriff as the Candidate to represent this town in the ensuing Parliament, we will immediately present and prosecute the necessary petition against the validity of such return."

Several other gentlemen addressed the meeting, and it was resolved to celebrate the day of their delivery from bondage by a public dinner, and on the motion of the Hon. Captain Trench, it was resolved, that after they should have toasted the independence of Galway, they should give a ball and supper to their fair country-women.

Monday last, the Rev. Edmond French was elected Roman catholic warden of Galway, in the room of the late lamented warden Bodkin.

GENTLEMEN,

THE Poll has closed, and the Sheriffs have returned a Majority for Colonel VEREKER, while substantially the actual Majority is with me. Of the conduct of the Magistrates and Sheriffs of this City, I will not here stop to speak. Other Tribunals shall decide upon them—let it suffice to observe, that, while by the former, your attempt at Registry was refused, because your Number would hereafter have overpowered the nominal Majority for Colonel Vereker, the latter almost uniformly rejected every objection made on my part, and as uniformly admitted every objection made by my opponent. The connection also that subsisted between the Candidate and the returning Officers, was alike notorious; the former directing, and the latter obeying the directions they received.

On such a scene it is painful to dwell—the sensation it excited was that of general disgust, and your forbearance on an occasion so irritating and revolting, refutes that calumny, that would represent you as disorderly. Under circumstances so provoking, never was the public feeling so insulted and so restrained; and it redounds highly to your character, that no temptation, however strong, could urge you, in one single instance, to violate the Law.

This contest has convinced you, that those who withhold your rights, are for the last time successful—the law, to which you have appealed, will read your charters for you, as they should be read, and the thousands, who are about to Register will assert your right to elect him, whom you may prefer.

To have been the Candidate, selected by you on the present occasion is the proudest feeling of my heart.—To deserve and retain your approbation, is the honest object of my youthful ambition—I therefore thus devote myself to your service—I offer you my most strenuous exertions, in asserting that independence on which alone I wish to stand—and I solemnly assure you, that if, on any future occasion, some other Candidate should be thought more worthy of your favour, I will support his pretensions with the same zeal and fidelity with which you have supported me.
