Shortly previous to the final close of the poll on  
Thursday, Mr. John Bennett announced that he had  
made a discovery of considerable importance, which he  
was about to state. "For, gentlemen, (said Mr. B.)  
though the Sheriffs may declare the hon. bart. and  
another candidate who has fled, and left, not a Town-  
Major, but one more fond of an engagement—to fill  
his place, as the members elected—yet, gentlemen, it  
is my duty to state a most important fact, which has  
just come to my knowledge. I am instructed that one  
of the candidates, Sir Nicholas Colthurst, is actually a  
catholic—(loud laughing)—and has been regularly bap-  
tized and christened by Father Callaghan, the parish  
priest of Ardrum—(continued bursts of laughter—who  
was very well paid, as I understand, for his trouble.—  
Gentlemen, you may laugh, but I actually hold in my  
hand a certificate establishing beyond all doubt the  
truth of what I state—(loud laughing.)—I do, there-  
fore, with great deference, beg leave to ask the baronet,  
whether he admits what I have stated, as I will be in a

answer."—(loud and continued bursts of laughing.)

resumed—"Well, then, as the baronet is determined
