Wednesday morning last, at his house in William-
 street, after a tedious and painful illness, which he bore
 with truly Christian fortitude, William Wallace, Esq.
 aged 68, a Burgess of the Corporation of this city, hav-
 ing served the office of Sheriff in 1784, and for many
 years President of the Limerick Annuity Society. With
 the utmost feelings of regret we record the demise of
 this respectable gentleman; possessing the highest de-
 gree of candour, honorable and honest in all his actions,
 he gained the esteem of his fellow-citizens, and is sin-
 cerely lamented by his family and numerous connec-
 tions. His remains were this morning conveyed to St.
 Mary's church-yard, attended by a large concourse of
 the most respectable gentlemen.
