Three sail of the Newfoundland convoy have arrived at Plymouth. They left Honduras with a fleet of 11 sail, under convoy of the Frolic of 18 guns, Captain Winyates-on the 16th Oct. the convoy encountered a most tremendous gale, in which the Frolic lost both top masts-two days after the gale, they fell in with an American frigate, between the Charlestown and the Chesapeak, on which the Frolic made the signal for the convoy to disperse, and in order to favour their escape, soon after (under jury masts) brought the American to close action; and the second broad-side the enemy lost both main and mizen top-mast, which were shot away. Close action was maintained with great spirit and vigor by the brig for about an hour and half, when she was unfortunately dismasted, until which time her colours were flying-they went overboard with her masts, and it is feared she was soon after taken possession of. Some letters from Plymouth state, in positive terms, that the Frolic has been actually captured, and that the ship to which she was obliged to strike, after a most gallant resistance, was the American frigate the Essex. The naval officers at Plymouth speak highly of this gallant action, and express their belief that had the brig's masts stood, she would have captured the frigate although treble her strougth. It is believed that all the convoy have escaped.

PARSONSTOWN. Nov. 28 .- We are informed that on Wednesday night last, as the Galway coach was proceeding on its way between that town and Loughrea, it was attacked by an armed banditti; but who were spiritedly resisted by the guard, who shot one of the villains, on which the rest of the band betook themselves to flight. It is said a subscription has been set on foot to reward the guard for his bravery.
