We have received, in due course, London prints to
the 17th instant, to-wit:

Despatches from Marquis Wellington, dated at
Madrid the 18th ult. may be found in a preceding
column. Joseph Bonaparte left Ocaña on the 16th,
and proceeded towards Valencia—the remains of
Marmont's army it appears have rallied a little, as
they have advanced from Burgos and entered Val-
adolid on the 14th. General Hill and his opponent in
Estremadura, are much in the same situation. It is
obvious, that the French divisions are using every
endeavour to form a junction—and if they can accom-
plish this object, and receive the reinforcement under
Massena, the situation of our brave army would be
extremely perilous, as they would have to contend
against fearful odds; but we still hope, that the con-
summate skill of Marquis Wellington will prevent
this combination, by cutting off the last one or other
of these divisions. Joseph and Suchet may probably

The accounts of the authority of a Dover letter,
referring to a Fifteenth Bulletin of a victory over the
