We have received, in due course, London prints to the 17th instant, inclusive.

Despatches from Marquis Wellington, dated at Madrid the 18th ult., may be found in a preceding column. Joseph Bonaparte left Ocaña on the 16th, and proceeded towards Valencia—the remains of Masséna's army it appears have rallied a little, as they have advanced from Burgos and entered Valladolid on the 14th. General Hill and his opponent in Extremadura, are much in the same situation. It is obvious, that the French divisions are using every endeavour to form a junction—and if they can accomplish this object, and receive the reinforcement under Massena, the situation of our brave army would be extremely perilous, as they would have to contend against fearful odds; but we still hope, that the consummate skill of Marquis Wellington will prevent this combination, by cutting off the last one or other of these divisions. Joseph and Soult may probably unite, but we conceive that many difficulties should be encountered by Soult in effecting a similar purpose.

The account on the authority of a Dover letter, referring to a Fifteenth Bulletin of a victory over the Russians, is generally believed to be nothing more than a stock-jobbing experiment—an authentic news of importance from this quarter. The expected conference at Abu is stated to have taken place, but of their deliberations or the result, even conjecture has not informed us, except that the Emperor Alexander has conferred high Russian dignities on Bernadotte and Lord Cathcart, which apparently demonstrates mutual friendship—time alone can develop the rest.

Still we are obliged to linger in dread suspense for definitive intelligence from America—many circumstances are urged by different opinonists, on the doubtful question of peace or war, but we cannot conceive that they throw the least gleam of light on the subject, and could only contribute to the torturing suspense the public already endure.
