We allude to the excessive and very important exportation of potatoes, which is carried on from the minor harbours, particularly in the districts of Cork, to England and other parts. We know that a merchant of that city, has obtained an English Order for Three Hundred Tons, and we have every reason to believe that he is intended to execute it—We beg leave, very humbly, to represent to the Government, that the consequences of exporting such quantities of that commodity, which the poorer classes of the community are dependent for support, are much to be dreaded. We solicit them very earnestly to interpose their authority, for the suppression of such an exportation, the consideration of its results, it may be considered.
