We lament to have occasion to observe a further instance of barbarity in the lower order of persons, on the 11th inst. at a Fair held at Castletown, in this County, by two ferocious factions who agreed to meet and riot—information however being given to George Massy, Esq. a Magistrate for said County, he attended at the Fair with a party of the 1st Dragoon Guards stationed at Ballingarry, and preserved order to a late hour and until the business of the Fair was over, and during the day made search in several places for the rioters and their arms, to no effect;—it appears the ruffians had taken positions in two extensive Turf Bogs at either side of the Fair Field, and after the Magistrate and Military had retired, (late in the evening) the misguided persons immediately proceeded to the Fair Field, and after a heavy discharge from fire arms, one man named Joseph Cullinane, was mortally wounded, of which he that night died. An Inquest was held on the body by John Cox, Esq. one of the Coroners for said County. Several persons have been severely wounded, and some innocent persons unconnected with the rioters; and it is believed had the riot commenced at an early hour vast mischief would have taken place.—Several of the insurgents are reported to have come from Bruff and its Vicinity, armed with fire-locks.

A number of fellows with shirts outside their apparel and armed, assembled in the neighbourhood of Meelick on Monday night, and turned up four acres of ground belonging to Mr Palmer, and two acres the property of a farmer named Fitzgerald.
