—Thursday se'nnight died at his seat at Stowe, Buckinghamshire, the Right Hon. George Grenville Nugent Temple, Marquis of Buckingham, Lord Temple, Viscount and Baron Cobham, in Great Britain, and Earl Nugent, in Ireland, Knight of the Garter, Lord Lieutenant and Custos Rotulorum of the County of Bucks, High Steward of Buckingham and of Westminster, one of the Tellers of the Exchequer, &c. His Lordship was born June 17, 1759, succeeded on the demise of his uncle, Richard, Earl Temple, and was created Marquis of Buckingham in 1784. His Lordship twice filled the distinguished situation of Lord Lieutenant of Ireland. His Lordship married April 16th, 1775, Mary, eldest daughter and heiress to Robert Earl Nugent, of the Kingdom of Ireland, (to whose Earldom he succeeded on the death of that Nobleman, in 1788, in consequence of a limitation of the patent) by this Lady (who was created an Irish Peeress in 1800, by the title of Baroness Nugent, with remainder to her second son Lord George)—His Lordship has issue Richard Earl Temple, born March 16, 1776, now the Marquis of Buckingham, and Lord George Grenville Nugent Temple (by the demise of his mother, Baroness Nugent) now Baron Nugent, of Carlanstown, born December, 20, 1788, and Lady Mary, born July 8th.
