

**THIS EVENING'S MAIL.**

The London Papers of Monday have arrived. It is stated that two French Generals have been shot at Paris, viz. Lenois and Bardeins—Riots have taken place in almost every town in France, in resisting the Conscription.

A report of the capture of the American frigate U. States by the Acosta frigate, Captain Kerr, after an engagement of four hours, was reached the Admiral at Plymouth, from Bermuda, at which place, it is said, it has arrived.

The Austrian Ambassador, with dispatches, that landed at Adborough, arrived in London, on Monday.

The troops that have been embarked at Plymouth, for America, have got a sudden order to re-land, and the Expedition to the Coast of America at present countermanded.

A change has been effected in the Regency at Cadix, and Cardinal Bourbon is appointed to the principal situation.

Wednesday evening, the Right Worshipful Mayor, as Coroner, held an inquest on the Body of Elizabeth Williams, who was found drowned at the Pool on that day—Verdict—"Accidental Death, by falling into the River on the 26<sup>th</sup> February last."
