Report of Ogdenburgh.
In a letter dated Sackett's Harbor, received to General Dearborn, says, "I received an express from Capt. Mearns, of the enemy's having succeeded in taking out of Ogdenburgh, yesterday, at 10 o'clock. It was not done without bloodshed, in which the enemy suffered. The enemy attacked in two columns, each, at about 8 o'clock in the morning. Captain reports 20 men killed and 100 wounded. Lieutenant Baird, and his rifle men fired, that he lost three times that number. He led with all his force to Blockading this side of Ogdenburgh. He had more than double the number of the British. There were no stores at Ogdenburgh."

The bill for the partial suspension of the non-importation law (engrossed) was passed in committee of the whole on Monday in May was agreed to, and then reported, read a third time and passed—Ayes 75, Noes 33. The use of foreign licenses was rejected to lie on the table.

Monday last, the North Downshire Regiment of Militia marched from Clonmel, to embark at Cork. The Leitrim Militia are daily expected in Dublin from Bristol, and on their arrival, the Kilkenny Regt. will sail for Bristol.

The Louth Militia embarked, on the 1st instant, at Liverpool, for this country. The Warwick and Northumberland Militia, quartered in Dublin, turned out their entire quota on Thursday, for the Line. The City Limerick Militia, cantoned in the Co. Cavan, have received a letter of readiness, and are to embark at Dublin for England.

The following Regiments may be expected in Ireland from England, within this month, viz—Carlisle, Care, Cork North, Dublin City, King's County, Leitrim, Limerick County, Louth, Mayo South, Meath, Roscommon, Sligo, Tipperary, Waterford, and Westmeath.

The Royal Cornwall, quartered at Castibar, are to embark at Cork immediately. The Armagh Regiment, commanded by the Right Hon Earl Gosford, has left Tullamore, for to embark at Dublin.
